FOURTEENTH INFANTRY SAILS FOR ISLANDS

Boys Leave Vancouver Amid Cheers of Thousands of Townspeople.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Vancouver, Wash., Jan. 2.—Amid the noise of a thousand voices, the tooting of whistles and the strains of music by the regimental band, the Fourteenth infantry regiment of the United States army is leaving Vancouver today on their third trip to the islands of the Pacific.

The townpeople turned out en masse to bid the boys farewell. More than a thousand people were gathered on the dock as the steamer Spencer swung out into the stream with the first section on board.

The trip to the islands will be nothing new for a large number of the enlisted men. A goodly portion of the regiment has seen service in the tropics once before and there are a few veterans who have been twice.

Following is the personnel of the commanding staff of the departing regiment: Colonel George H. Martin, command of the regiment, Major John R. Barke will command the third battalion, Major Alfred H. Henshaw the second battalion, and Captain A. L. Lassaigne will command the first battalion and company A.

MR. KILKENEN ANGRY AT ROTHSCHILD

Declare Baron Is Carrying on Illegal Competition Under Charity Mask.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Paris, Jan. 1.—A few years ago Baron Henri de Rothschild, who is a doctor of medicine, started in the most populous district of Paris a philanthropic dairy for the free supply of pure milk to poor people. The institution became well known, and large numbers of people of position paid for the milk and became customers of the baron, who has now 68 pure milk depots in Paris.

Yesterday the Milk Dealers' union sued Baron de Rothschild before the tribunal of commerce on the ground that under the pretense of a work of philanthropy he was carrying on illegal competition, the tradesmen being obliged to take out trade and pay taxes, which the baron, as a philanthropist, escaped.

It was alleged that Baron de Rothschild, through agents, bought milk at wholesale prices and resold it at a large profit; that, as a matter of fact, he only gave away 1280 worth of milk each annum; and that the charges against them were dismissed. Judgment was postponed. The baron's counsel denied the assertion that his business was not a work of philanthropy.

MRS. GEORGE ROSS OF LEBANON DEAD

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Lebanon, Or., Jan. 1.—Mrs. George Ross died at her home, about three miles north of Lebanon, Sunday afternoon, after a long illness, of heart disease, at the age of 67 years. She was born at Erie, Pennsylvania, January 22, 1841.

She was married to Mr. Ross in 1859. They came to Oregon in 1875 and to Lebanon in 1883. Mrs. Ross leaves her husband, four sons and one daughter. Rev. J. B. Beatty, pastor of the Methodist Episcopal church, conducted funeral services at the family residence, Monday. Interment was made in the Masonic cemetery.

STRANGELY FAMILIAR ODOR COMES TO TOWN

LOGGER DROWNED IN DAILY'S MILLPOND

Knock Anderson Loses His Life at Vancouver New Year's Eve.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Vancouver, Wash., Jan. 2.—Enoch Anderson, a youth engaged as a logger at Daily's sawmill near here, lost his life on New Year's eve by drowning. He fell into the mill pond from a log while alone and it is presumed from the condition of his body that he struck a log as he entered the water. Anderson went to the river about 5 o'clock to drive a few logs into the mill pond. He returned at 6 o'clock when he expected to find workmen there starting in trace of the unfortunate young man. Going to the mill pond tracks where he had fallen into the pond were visible. His body was soon located in 15 feet of water.

County Auditor's Report.

Vancouver, Wash., Jan. 2.—Following is a summary of the business done by the county auditor during December: patents 1, deeds 115, mortgages 52, satisfactions 43, chattel mortgages 7, satisfactions 5, marriage licenses 49, all other instruments 57. The total amount taken in by the office during the month was \$42,845. Of this \$49 goes to the county clerk for marriage certificates. While the total amount taken in during December, 1907, was not as large as in that of the previous year, taking into consideration the fact that the marriage license fee has been reduced from \$5 to \$3 the month just closed compares very favorably.
