KNIFE PROVES MAN'S SUICIDE

Weapon Is Found Near Aurora With Which Phegley Ended His Life.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Aurora, Or., Jan. 3.—The finding of the dead body of James Phegley, the Canby man who had been missing from his home since Tuesday, December 17, about two miles from this city yesterday morning, sets at rest the numerous rumors concerning his disappearance, and plainly shows that Mr. Phegley came to his death by his own hand, and that death was premeditated.
Searching parties had been organized Wednesday from Aurora and Woodburn and along the road, and on Tuesday, New Year's day the buggy belonging to Mr. Phegley was found in the woods a short distance from the road, about one and a half miles from here, by M. H. Lee of Canby, who was one of the searching party. In the buggy was found a note saying, "This rig belongs to Canby," and the harness and a valise containing papers relating to Mr. Phegley's business. All these articles were covered over with an oil cloth to protect them from the rain.
As soon as the buggy was found the searching parties, headed by J. W. Cook, son-in-law of the deceased, came to the conclusion that the body was not far off, but as darkness was approaching it was deemed advisable to postpone further search until Thursday, when a more thorough investigation was made, and the ground near where the buggy was found carefully gone over.
Early Thursday morning the searching party joined with the searchers from here and in less than an hour W. H. Crittenden of the Aurora party found the dead body of James Phegley, who was under a large fallen tree that afforded shelter from the rain, and laid in an easy position, as if the man had fallen there. The body was lying partially on the left side. When discovered no marks of violence were discernible on the body, and it looked like a case of suicide, as an eight-ounce bottle of Zemaol, a preparation for cure of scabies, was found near by, partly emptied. Coroner Clough was at once notified, but as the case looked like suicide he deputized E. A. Snyder of this city to act in the matter and take charge of the remains.
The body was brought to the city about 10 o'clock and taken to Mr. Snyder's undertaking rooms. When the clothing was removed from the body it was found that the left jugular vein had been cut and a deep stab made over the region of the heart. There was no cut through the clothing to show that any wounds had been made, and the head of the dead man was lying over on the left side so that it was impossible to tell that he had cut his throat when first discovered. The underclothing had been rolled up over the region of the heart and there was no knife cut through it.
Knife Is Found.
As soon as it was ascertained that there were no marks of violence on the body a searching party consisting of J. W. Cole, S. A. Miller, W. H. Crittenden, M. H. Lee, George Fry, Lorin Snyder, Ed Becke and The Journal's correspondent, drove to the place where the body had been found, and close to where the body had been lying J. W. Cook found a two-bladed pocket knife, with the large blade, two and a half inches long, and dink pointed, open—the weapon which Mr. Phegley evidently killed himself with.
Seven dollars was found in a pocket-book—a \$5 gold piece, a silver dollar and a 50-cent and 25-cent piece in

UMATILLA COUNTY TO EXHIBIT FINE FRUIT

Oregon Growers Decide to Make Big Showing at Annual Walla Walla Fair.

Pendleton, Or., Jan. 3.—Umatilla county expects to have a fine exhibit of fruit at the meeting of the Horticultural association of the northwest which will take place in Walla Walla, January 29, 30 and 31.
Fruit raising is to be discussed, and it is becoming more evident each year that land in eastern Oregon and Washington is far too valuable to be used for wheat raising when much more can be made by raising fruit. It can be shown now that land which will raise from 45 to 50 bushels of wheat to the acre two years out of three, will give returns of from \$400 to \$500 an acre every year when orchards are planted. Papers will be read by prominent fruit growers of the northwest. Among those who will be here are J. N. Brown of North Yakima, deputy fruit inspector of the state; Mr. Sheppard, president of the Hood River Growers' association; Mr. Schelscher of Lewiston, one of the most successful grape growers of the northwest, and others.
