Cheering News Received by Merchants National From Treasury Department—Certificates of Deposit Being Readily Accepted.

Examiner E. T. Wilson of the treasury department, in charge of the Merchants National bank, received a letter from the department this morning assuring him "if the depositors of the institution will accept the certificates of deposit to such an extent as you deem satisfactory, then it will be satisfactory to the department."

"We hope to be able to issue the necessary certificates very shortly," said Mr. Wilson. "And it is up to the depositors whether we do so or not. We cannot urge upon them too strongly the advisability of coming in and giving us their assistance without waiting to be called upon individually. We have almost enough money to reopen now and all we need is for those who have not yet been in to see us to come and talk the matter of reopening over."

PRESIDENT ASKS FOR RESIGNATION

Washington, Jan. 4.—President Roosevelt created another stir in political circles today by asking for the resignation of Ernest G. Eagleson, surveyor-general of Idaho.
