

ANOTHER STORM ON THE COAST. NEWS PAPER 70 YEARS OLD SAYS VAN BUREN'S MESSAGE WILL BORE MAN. SEARCH FOR THE FAR NORTH. APPROPRIATION EQUAL TO THAT MADE PORTLAND ASSURED FOR EXPOSITION. COOS BAY LINER DELAYED BY STORM

Wires to Marshfield Are Torn Down by Gale and Agents Here Learn Nothing Further of Craft's Movements.

Breakwater, Coos Bay, Jan. 7. Steamer Coos Bay, which left for Marshfield at 10:30 a. m. yesterday, was delayed by a heavy gale.

Another storm is approaching from the sea, and it will undoubtedly be felt here this evening.

Northbound vessels have been making good speed, but vessels heading in a southerly direction find it hard work bucking the tremendous sea and bearing up against a heavy wind.

The steamer Breakwater which arrived here last night from San Francisco made fine speed, and her passengers suffered little from the pitching of the vessel because she ran with the waves.

After discharging some general freight at Coos Bay, the steamer will proceed to Marshfield to load 50 tons of wheat.

The steamer Breakwater which was forced to put back to Astoria yesterday, after having been hit by a wave has not been heard from since.

The accident to the Breakwater was almost entirely due to the fact that the steamer Alliance a few weeks ago when she crossed the bar.

TO AVOID COLLISIONS. Captain Werlich Requests Tug Men to Observe Precaution.

Captain P. J. Werlich, lighthouse inspector, has requested the tugmen at the mouth of the Columbia river to tow vessels beyond the lightship station when possible to do so as a precautionary measure.

Captain Werlich's investigation at Astoria yesterday of the collision between the British ship Port Patrick and lightship No. 56 revealed the fact that the windmill was dropped at a point about three miles from the lightship.

Captain Werlich made the request several months ago and informed one day that a large Italian vessel outward bound came drifting by the lightship one day, within 100 feet of the windmill.
