

### BULLET STUNS GOLDEN EAGLE

#### Yakima Hunter Makes Remarkable Shot and Captures Full Grown Bird.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)  
Yakima, Jan. 7.—The remarkable capture of one of the largest golden eagles ever seen in this valley was effected last Sunday by T. S. Darby, a resident of Fruitvale. The bird weighs about forty pounds and measures 27 inches from tip to tip. It is a beautiful specimen of the American eagle. Mr. Darby has sold the bird to a well-known butcher in Yakima. The latter is now having made a cage in which he expects to exhibit the eagle to patrons of his butcher shop on Yakima avenue.

To capture a full grown eagle and in the manner described by Mr. Darby is something out of the ordinary and probably will not occur within his lifetime. He was out hunting in the upper Cowlitz at the time and had just reached the brow of a hill and started over when suddenly in front of him, but a few feet distant, he discovered the eagle beneath a sage brush devouring the remains of a rock rabbit. Quick as a flash Mr. Darby brought his gun to his shoulder and as quickly did the eagle rise in its flight and make off, carrying the rabbit in its talons.

It is probably due to the fact that Mr. Darby's gun was loaded with bird shot that he did not hit the eagle when he fired. Had he been hunting wildcats and cougars, rather than jack rabbits, he no doubt would have been carrying buckshot and the eagle would certainly have been killed the bird, instead of merely stunning it as he did. When he pulled the trigger of his gun the energetic bullet struck the eagle's head and he fell as though it had been hit by a bullet from Sheriff John Edwards' trusty Colt revolver. Mr. Darby ran quickly to where the bird had fallen and discovered at once that it was only stunned. He immediately seized it and secured its feet. A few moments later and the bird had thoroughly realized its predicament and began to fight for liberty. Mr. Darby, talking about the bird, said it required no little ingenuity to get the eagle home alive. It had only been grazed on the head with the small bird shot and was otherwise uninjured.

### ESCAPED LEPER FRIGHTENS CITY

#### Chinaman Elopes From San Francisco Pesthouse and Cannot Be Found.

San Francisco, Jan. 7.—Look Bel, a Chinese leper, 65 years of age, who has been an inmate of the pesthouse at Twenty-sixth street and De Haro avenue, for seven years has escaped and is still at liberty.

Look Bel made his escape yesterday by piling a couple of boxes up against the high fence which surrounds the pesthouse grounds. Then he climbed over the fence, and dropping down to the soft mud on the other side, scuttled away as fast as his legs would carry him.

It was hours before his disappearance was noticed. Then Superintendent A. A. O'Neill sent out a general alarm.

### GOVERNOR MAGOON TO END MASONS' STRIKE

Havana, Jan. 7.—Governor General Magoon has undertaken to settle the masons' strike. The contest has been pending for months. It has been marked by much violence. The employers finally seemed on the point of winning when other branches of labor came to the masons' aid. Representatives of 26 unions called on the governor general within the last few days to tell him that they proposed to go out in sympathy with the strikers. They were willing to resign to give the government a chance to act as mediator. Magoon has announced his intention to use his good offices. Had he failed to do so a general strike would have been declared at once. It is thought there is a fair chance of settlement.

### BRYAN SAYS PEOPLE LIKE TEDDY'S POLICY

Omaha, Jan. 7.—At the annual dinner of the Jeffersonian club of Nebraska last night William Jennings Bryan was the guest of honor. In his address Colonel Bryan said President Roosevelt's popularity is due to the belief of the people that he is trying to do right and protect their interests. He said: "No question is ever settled until the moral element in the question is discussed and determined. It is a moral issue—that is, an issue involving justice—stirs the heart. The time is ripe for another appeal to conscience, and indications point to a steady stream of public questions from the ethical standpoint. The corrupting influences which have flowed from mercenary politics have at last excited attention, and there is now a searching of men and of measures such as has not been known in recent times."

### POLITICAL POT BOILS AT SAN FRANCISCO

#### Democrats Lining Up Forces in Anticipation of Denver Convention.

San Francisco, Cal., Jan. 7.—The Democrats of San Francisco are prepared for a merry old time over the election of delegates to the national convention to be held at Denver in July. Already there is a secret movement on foot to give Gavin McNab and County Chairman Thomas Hickey the political battle of their lives. The same forces that opposed McNab at the last primary are now lined up in an effort to capture not only the San Francisco delegation, but delegations from other sections of the state.

McNab has been particularly strong in the country heretofore and has always had something to say about the delegations to the national conventions. His opponents claim that things will be different this time. Some of the opponents of McNab said to be favorable to the candidacy of Ex-Congressman Theodore Bell, who expects to be the temporary chairman of the national convention. Bell has already announced his candidacy. McNab in his usual silent manner has not declared himself one way or the other on Bell's candidacy, but it is almost certain that the California delegation will urge Bell's election. The Republicans have also started preparations for the election of their delegates to the Republican national convention, which will meet in Chicago in June. The Republican state central committee will meet at the St. Francis hotel, Saturday, January 18, to fix the time, place and apportionment for the state convention to select the national delegates.

### PORTUGAL PUTS BAN ON PRESS

#### Censorship So Rigid Telegraph Companies Close Offices at 6 o'Clock.

Madrid, Jan. 7.—A group of journalists have visited the minister La Cierva, to protest against the severity of the press censorship. The minister answered that he intended to make it more severe than ever, to prevent writings against the government, even if it did not touch public order. The telegraph companies, on account of government abuses, propose to shut their establishments at 6 o'clock in the evening.

Information from Lisbon is to the effect that a severe press censorship is being enforced in Portugal and that violation of correspondence by the government is the current thing in Lisbon. Many families are leaving the country for France and Spain and numerous commercial houses have closed their mercantile operations. The authorities believe that a great quantity of bombs are in the hands of enemies of the government for use on February 2, date assigned for a grand demonstration against the dictatorship.

### CONTRACT AWARDED FOR ELGIN SCHOOL
