CALMLY COUNTS OUT 1,500 DOUBLE EAGLES

Richard Colman Gives Hotel Clerk Nervous Prostration by Display.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Los Angeles, Cal., Jan. 9.—Richard L. Coleman of Tonopah, Nevada, threw the working force of the Hotel Alexandria into a state of nervous collapse when he registered, tossed a black handbag on the clerk's desk and quietly counted out 1,500 \$20 gold pieces of \$30,000 and asked that it be deposited in the vault. One of the strong boxes was filled with yellow coins which are fresh from the San Francisco mint.

TORPEDO BOAT DOES MYSTERIOUS STUNTS

(United Press Leased Wire.) Santa Barbara, Cal., Jan. 9.—A torpedo boat of the American navy, the name of which was not learned, did some mysterious maneuvering in the channel yesterday. After proceeding under full speed along the coast as far as the lighthouse the craft suddenly shot toward this city, then darted down the coast in the direction of Buena Vista, six miles east and was last seen, apparently returning to waters farther south. No attempt was made to communicate with the vessel. Whether the vessel was sent here to scout for smugglers or to make soundings could not be learned.
