

TRAGEDY IN CHILD'S LIFE TOLD COUNCIL BY FATHER

Broken-Hearted Parent Center of Dramatic Scene as He Recites Story of Wrecked Home—Councilmen Eager to Shift Conscious Guilt Onto Each Other.

A broken-hearted father, struggling vainly to restrain the tears which the recital of his life's sorrow brought to his eyes, formed a dramatic scene for the city council and 50 spectators yesterday afternoon, when E. F. Noland told of the tragedy which had ruined his home.

At Vaughn's announcement of his change of vote, Councilman Driscoll laughed. Turning on him, Councilman Vaughn lashed him into silence by declaring: "You may sit there and laugh, Mr. Driscoll, and you may vote for Conrad's license and for every other damnable resolution in the city, but you didn't have nerve enough to vote to revoke Conboy's license when I asked to have it done in the committee."

Each apparently felt the guilt upon the city and each tried to shift the blame of the past upon others. Contemptuously expressed for Councilman Vaughn for being the only one in the committee to vote to grant the transfer of Landerholm's license. Then Mr. Vaughn spoke.

"I said in the committee, and I repeat now, that this matter is simply a fight between two saloonmen and no other. I say now, as I said in committee, I will not allow me or any other saloonkeeper to be secured by the residents in his neighborhood on the license. This is in vogue in other cities and has proved successful in keeping out disorderly places."

When last seen, Samuelson wore a dark green suit, a stiff hat and a shirt with red and white stripes. He is a member of the Odd Fellows and Workmen, and wore a pin and button of those lodges.

Samuelson is not a drinking man. He has been married 14 years and has two children. Mrs. Samuelson says there had been family troubles and that she cannot imagine what has become of her husband.

The two victims were Yoshindo Sugioka, the proprietor of a Japanese hotel in that locality, and a woman named Tame. Sugioka was one of the most highly respected Japanese in Hawaii. A Japanese named Kukuda who had treated the woman Tame, according to a friend entered Sugioka's office in the hotel and asked for the woman. Sugioka called in the woman. After applying a number of epithets to the woman, Kukuda shot her through the head, his companion cutting her throat. Kukuda then shot Sugioka through the heart, the other murderer slashing the corpse in a frightful manner. Kukuda escaped, but his companion has been arrested.
