## TOM WORD WILL BE CANDIDATE FOR SHERIFF

### WILL TRY AGAIN FOR POSITION

Former Democratic Sheriff of Multnomah County and Present Republican Clerk Announce Candidacy for Reelection.

### Word on Same "Law Applies to Everyone" Platform—Opposed to Open Town—Fields' Good Record to Back His Aspirations.

Tom M. Word, former militant sheriff of Multnomah county, who fought the open town forces in their own stronghold and beat them back beyond the borders of his administration, will announce his candidacy for reelection to the office tomorrow morning when he will file his declaration of intention with the county clerk. At the same time, County Clerk F. S. Fields will file his declaration announcing his candidacy for re-nomination and reelection on the Republican ticket.

### TITLE'S TRUST FUNDS TO BE SETTLED FIRST

Judge Wolverton Postpones Hearing on Receiver's Petition—Expected by Thursday Ladd Will Complete Arrangements to Take Over Institution. Accounts Will Then Be Paid

Out of consideration for the negotiations pending between W. M. Ladd and the creditors of the Title Guarantee & Trust company, Judge Wolverton postponed the hearing of the receiver's petition to be allowed to pay certain trust funds collected by him until Thursday next. At that time Judge Wolverton will hear the arguments on the petition if any should be made, in his chambers, the courtroom being reserved for the hearing of the John Hall land fraud case.

The action came up before the court a week ago when Joseph Simon on behalf of the receiver of the bank filed a motion asking that the receiver be given permission to pay out \$24,000 in trust funds which had been collected by him.

At that time W. C. Bristol, representing the state and the American Surety company, opposed the motion and filed a second paper setting out the claims of his clients that the state had priority of right and that the funds deposited by State Treasurer Steel were trust funds and their nature and were thus entitled to share in any dividend paid.

Additional Motion Filed. Mr. Simon this morning stated to the court that he had filed an additional motion covering some \$12,000 of trust funds which had accumulated since the hearing a week ago. He said it was necessary to disburse these

### BOURNE'S COUP IS FAILURE

Junior Senator Tries to Persuade Judiciary Committee to Confirm Schuebel Before Fulton's Arrival at Washington.

Split in Marion County Over Recommendation of Bingham, Who Is Said to Be Attorney for Railroad Company.

(Washington Bureau of The Journal.) Washington, D. C., Jan. 10.—Senator Bourne tried to get the committee on judiciary of the senate to confirm the appointment of Schuebel immediately and before Senator Fulton arrived from Oregon. The appointment had been arranged to await Fulton's return so the attempt failed. Fulton is a member of the judiciary committee.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Salem, Jan. 10.—The split in the Republican delegation over the appointment of a United States district attorney, has injured Senator Fulton's chances of reelection in Marion county, in the estimation of some of his best friends. It is known that there was a protest on the part of some of his immediate followers over his endorsement of the candidacy of George G. Bingham, some saying it would cost him hundreds of votes among the farmers, as Mr. Bingham's long career as local attorney for the Southern Pacific and other corporations has not made him popular with that class of voters.

Now a number of Mr. Fulton's followers are said to be uniting in a formal demand that he fight the confirmation of Schuebel in the senate. The Schuebel appointment will be referred to the judiciary committee of the senate and Mr. Fulton will be asked to appear before that committee and register a kick at Mr. Schuebel on the ground of unfairness from a professional standpoint. It is very doubtful among others of Mr. Fulton's followers whether he will ever part company with his colleague in the senate. They say Mr. Fulton had really no candidate for the office of district attorney, but yielded to the demand of Congressman Hawley for his support of Bingham as a local Republican. It is known that Bingham had the warm backing of Ex-Gov. Ike Patterson, who came all the way from California to put in some good looks for Bingham.

The Salem man was not really Senator Fulton's choice, as Bingham was an ardent supporter of T. T. Geer for the senate. This last view is the most charitable one taken from a professional standpoint. But either way, fight or confirm, Fulton is bound to lose by the Schuebel-Bingham incident.

### TWO VICTIMS OF THE MISSED SHOT

Unexploded Charge Struck by Workmen on P. & S. Line—Three Hurt.

### TREASURY NEEDS TEN MILLIONS

Department Will Be Forced to Call on Banks to Secure Working Fund.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, D. C., Jan. 10.—The treasury department is making another dart on the banks for a part of the government deposits. Ten days ago, the treasury got about \$8,000,000. It was hoped at that time that internal receipts and receipts from customs and the department called "miscellaneous," would come up to normal and make unnecessary another call on the banks. But yesterday's treasury statement showed that there is no likelihood of this. The treasury must have \$10,000,000 at once. The working balance is again down to \$5,000,000.

### FIND SALOON COIN IN REFRIGERATOR

Burglars Raid Three Places on East Side and Find Foxy Owner's Cache.

Three saloons on the corner of Water and East Morrison streets were burglarized this morning between 1 and 4 o'clock. Entrance to each was secured through a rear window and the cash drawers were rifled of whatever money had been left in them. Three gold watches were also secured by the robbers.

When James Smith, the colored porter at the office bar, 303 East Morrison street, reached the saloon to open up at 4 o'clock this morning he was surprised to find that some one else had been there before him. He called out in the dark to find out who it was and the intruder broke out through the door and disappeared. Smith declares he can identify the man and says he has been hanging around the bar for several days.

### PASSENGERS ROBBED ON SPOKANE TRAIN

North Yakima, Wash., Jan. 10.—Two negro robbers who boarded No. 2 on the Northern Pacific at Spokane yesterday, robbed two passengers in the tourist sleeper of \$100 in cash and a gold watch. One robber was later arrested at Pasco and the other at Lind. The loot was recovered.
