He came to minister to that body and he came also on that resurrection morn and brought forth Jesus Christ from the tomb to give a living Saviour to dying men. The spirit is now in the world and his chief ministry is to shed abroad the grace of God in the hearts of men. He is turning water into wine and healing the sick, but they are as nothing to the daily miracles of the spirit when it lifts men out of their sins and makes them new in Christ. 'The day of Pentecost is still with us and the ministry of the spirit to sanctify those he saves and regenerates. Are you, Christians, more like Jesus who used to say: 'Have you more of his tenderness, humility and love for mankind? Then the holy spirit has been used to? Have you more of contact ready for the reappearance of the Lord; when all your sins are nailed to the cross, 'when the spirit and the bride (you) say come,' will the ministry of the holy ghost be completed."

We have had small violins made for them and one of them, Mary, shows more temperament than Anna. Mary looks like me, but she is only three and a half and so cannot play yet, but they draw the bow across the strings and Mary has a soft smile on Tuesday as if she delights in the pretty sounds she can make, but Anna just goes at it this way," illustrating with vigorous gestures, shaking his curly head and doubling up his slender, sensitive fingers. 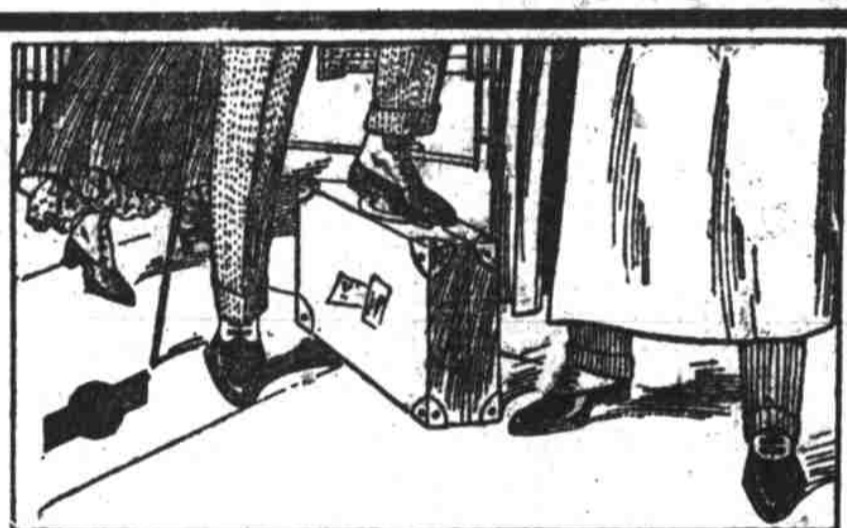
