WALLA WALLA RACING OF CALIFORNIA COLTS'S MEACE TO BREEDING INDUSTRY

MISSIONARIES SHOW CORRESPONDENCE BETWEEN COLLEGE AND SAMUELS

Whitman college has come back with a plausible answer to the charges made by Le Samuels, who pitched professional baseball for Spokane and Butte in the Northwest league, and who is now a student in the University of Idaho, that he had been offered inducements to enter the Walla Walla institution. Samuels asserted that when he submitted his terms to Whitman, a reply was received which they were too high.

Professor W. A. Hendricks, chairman of the scholarship committee, submits letters showing the correspondence between Samuels and the college authorities. Every year Whitman sends out a circular letter offering scholarships to students who have graduated from high schools, have been recommended by principals as worthy and who are in need of financial assistance. It was one of these letters which was received by Samuels.

At present, according to Professor Hendricks, there are but three of the holders of 40 scholarships at Whitman who are members of athletic teams, two of these being the young men of the Alfred Belt of Spokane, and the other, Tracy Cox. All these scholarships become void at once when a scholar falls below 80 per cent in any of his classes. Here is Samuels' proposition, along with that of another Spokane High school athlete.

"Spokane, Wash., Jan. 6, 1908.—Mr. Hendricks, Walla Walla, Washington: Sir—In reply to letter of July 15, 1907, will say of my record in the Whitman I would need some financial aid, such as \$20 per month and laundry and \$30 per month each.

"If a job could be secured so we could make this much we would be glad to provide it did not take too much time from our studies.

"We think we would make a good addition to the team of the college."

Whitman's "Too High" Answer.
With their usual frankness the Whitman college authorities, which evidently closed the matter so far as they were concerned.

"Your letter of January 6 has been received and contents noted. I am compelled to say that you must have grossly misunderstood our correspondence. We are not offering you a job where you could earn as much as an ordinary man gets for the whole of his time, and allow you sufficient time to do justice to your studies.

"With reference to the expenses connected with tuition and fees we have a limited number of scholarships which are granted to those who can bring high recommendations from the schools where they have been attending. The scholarships, however, are awarded on the basis of the student's record for the year and the recommendation of the principal of the school from which the student comes. They are not given on the basis of athletic ability.

"We are indeed glad to receive here young men who are interested in true sport, but we are unable to pay the expenses of a student who wishes to play on the Walla Walla and play on the Whitman college baseball team. Moreover, we believe that a young man who would be willing to sell himself to a college for this purpose and on this ground loses a great deal more than he could possibly receive. It is our policy, that any such arrangement must be made on the basis of honor and merit.

"That it is possible for an excellent athlete to receive at some institutions of this country such financial aid does not in the least change our policy. It is our policy that we will not lay the foundation of his own destruction and practically insure the failure of his life after he has completed his college course.

Washington State college is the other institution charged with the same position as the association of students. There are many who wonder if Pullman can submit as clear a denial as Whitman college.

Big Crowd New Year's.

The new year dawned brightly and there was a breeze as balmy as that of Oregon in May. VANCOUVER CLUB TO SELL ITS FRANCHISE

British Columbians Are Discouraged Over Inability to Secure Competent Man.

The owners of the local club even went so far as to offer a manager \$2,500 as salary with a good bonus for the first year.

CHEHALIS KEEPS UP STREET BUILDING

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Chehalis, Wash., Jan. 11.—The retiring city council will go down in the history of the city as having inaugurated more street improvements, work and work of a more substantial character than was ever previously done here. Its last official act was to approve the assessment for the vitrified brick pavement on Market street, a \$46,000 job, and to pass an ordinance for paving the streets and the business district. The new council will carry on this latter job as soon as the engineer's work is completed. The preliminary estimate is \$40,000. Considerable cement sidewalk work is now going on in the business district.

SALOON MEN PAY FOR CITY IMPROVEMENTS

Pendleton, Or., Jan. 11.—For the past year the regular running expenses of the city of Pendleton aggregate \$34,424, a sum that is more than \$5,000 greater than the expenses of the year previous. However, to offset this increase the receipts from liquor licenses amount to nearly \$10,000 more than they did last year, while more money was also collected for fines during 1907 than during 1906.

HUNDRED AND SIXTY THOUSAND MEN IDLE

NEWS FORECAST OF GOOD WEEK

Oregon Land Fraud Cases Will Attract Attention of Whole Nation.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, D. C., Jan. 11.—The Thaw trial in New York and the entertainment of the American battleship fleet at Rio Janeiro will share public attention with the proceedings of congress during the coming week.

Monday is the date set for beginning the trial of the land fraud cases in Oregon. Francis J. Heney will conduct the government's case.

Important legislation affecting the militia affairs will be discussed at the annual convention of the National Guard association of the United States, which will begin a three days' session in Boston Monday.

At the international convention of the United Mine Workers of America, beginning at Indianapolis Tuesday, decision will be made as to a possible strike of every union mine in the United States and Canada when the contracts expire next April will be made.

The Fairbanks presidential boom will be started rolling Tuesday when the Republican state central committee of Indiana elects new members and meets two days later to select a campaign chairman. The campaign will be entrusted to James P. Goodrich, an ardent Fairbanks man and chairman during the last three campaigns.

Secretary of War Taft will be the guest of honor and principal speaker Tuesday evening at the annual banquet of the Ohio society of Philadelphia.

The Nevada legislature will convene in Reno Tuesday afternoon to consider the labor troubles at Goldfield.

A trade conference at which all the West India colonies will be represented will assemble Tuesday at Barbados. Canada will send delegates to consider the question of closer trade relations between these colonies and the dominion.

In the musical world the event of the week will be the American debut of Miss Petrasina, which will be made at the Manhattan opera house Wednesday night.

Many Democratic leaders of national prominence are expected to attend a banquet at Lincoln, Nebraska, Wednesday night in honor of William J. Bryan.

The New York State Progressive Democratic league is scheduled for Thursday night in Cooper Union, with Senator Joseph D. P. of Arkansas as the chief speaker.

One of the most important conventions of the week will be that of the National Grocers' association in Helena, Montana, at which will be discussed the public land policy, the 25-cent tariff on foreign sugar, and numerous other questions of general interest.

GEORGE A. DORSEY WILL MAKE EXTENSIVE EXPLORATIONS IN WILD COUNTRIES.

(United Press Leased Wire.) New York, Jan. 11.—Among the passengers sailing on the Lusitania today is George A. Dorsey, curator of the Department of Anthropology of the Field Museum of Natural History of Chicago, who will circle the globe to map out a plan for a series of expeditions that will constitute one of the most comprehensive explorations of unknown lands ever attempted by any institution.

Dr. Dorsey will first revisit the museums of London, Paris and Vienna, and will proceed to Egypt, where he proposes to remain several weeks, examining important monuments. He will then go to Ceylon, where he will visit the Rich Veddahs, considered the lowest in culture of all the inhabitants of the earth. Southern India will be his next stop, for a visit to the primitive tribes of the Nilgiri Hills.

Slam and the ruins of Cambodia, then Sumatra, are on his list. In Java he will examine the ruins of Buddhist temples erected over 2,000 years ago, one of them almost as large as the largest of the Egyptian pyramids. From Java he will visit Australia, where he expects not only to visit the museums of the large cities but to gain some first-hand knowledge of the native blacks. In New Zealand he will study the Maori, once cannibals and remarkable for their tattooing.

From New Zealand Dr. Dorsey will go to New Caledonia and the Hebrides, belonging to the Melanesian group of islands. He intends to lay the foundation for a complete exploration of this group, which includes also New Guinea, New Ireland, New Britain and the Admiralty and Fiji Islands. After completing his work in the south Pacific Dr. Dorsey will visit some of the principal cities of China and go on to the Philippines, where he will explore some of the little known parts of Mindanao and Mindoro. Thence he will return home by way of Japan and San Francisco.

WORK CREWS RETURN TO JOBS ON RAILROAD
