Originally the towage service was wholly for the benefit of O. R. & N. grain exports, and the company felt that it was their duty to get a towage business and dispose of its boats.

The Port of Columbia commission bill was drawn and passed with a view to taking care of the service that is to be abandoned by the railroad company. It is admitted that the towage service must be maintained, and the opinion is general that the state or the port of Portland should have assumed charge long since, in the interest of the commerce and export trade not only of Oregon, but the entire inland empire, upon the development of which Portland relies for its growth and prosperity.

It is thought the service, if managed by the Port of Portland commission, can be made self-sustaining. The initial bond issue will be \$1,000,000, providing for the provision of the needed towage plant.

Section 1. The corporate powers of the Port of Portland, a municipal corporation, as established and created by certain acts of the legislative assembly of the state of Oregon, are hereby extended and enlarged.

Section 2. The Port of Portland shall be entitled to a lien upon any vessel for any sums due it for piloting or towing such vessel and for the expenses of such vessel shall, in addition, be jointly and severally liable to the Port of Portland.

Section 3. Section 4. For the purpose of acquiring suitable tug boats and pilot boats, the Port of Portland is authorized to issue bonds to the amount of \$1,000,000.
