### Proposal to Carry Big Game to Portland as Discussed at Eugene.

University of Oregon, Eugene, Jan. 15.—A great deal of discussion is being caused throughout the university over the agreement entered into by committees representing Oregon Agricultural college and Oregon providing that the annual football game between the institutions shall be played at Portland in future.

In the current number of the Oregon Weekly appeared an editorial, under the caption, "An Unwise Move," which shows the attitude of a majority of the students. The editorial in part follows: "The strongest argument in favor of the game being played in the metropolis is from a commercial and financial standpoint. The enormous amount of money secured by such a game for both institutions would fill the treasuries of the associated students with such an abundance of money that other student enterprises could be admirably supported. Such a fact can not be denied. But the game as now played alternately at Eugene and Corvallis nets each team yearly approximately \$1,000, which is a sufficient sum to help pay the expenses of the season. The game as it now stands is of sufficient inducement to make up all deficits. To have an ideal in football, such as the commercial ideal, is contrary to the very intention of college athletics. Such a tendency is a policy which will bring an end to the game and ultimately lead to the abolishment of the game."

"Not only is the financial objection alone, but in playing the game away from the college town, the spirit would soon be at a minimum. Whenever athletic contests are held away from the college campus, they soon lose their wholesome and degenerate into the various forms of professional rivalry will disappear."

Our educational institutions cannot afford to let their athletics degenerate into such an amusement. Such a gain would tend to kill the wholesome, keen, rival spirit which manifested itself so effectively in the game just past with the O. A. C. team.

As the matter of both institutions would be at a great expense in Portland and naturally, a great falling off in the number of student attendance would be evident. The people of the college town want the game in their city, and especially the enterprising citizens of Eugene, who are so loyal supporters of their undertaking.

If the athletic council decides to accept this agreement only one championship game will be played in Eugene this year. Next year this will be with Washington and the year following with Idaho.

### Stanford University Team Will Proceed to Chase Professionals Out of P. N. A.

Stanford University, Cal., Jan. 15.—Stanford will play her first baseball game January 25. The game is scheduled with St. Mary's college. Captain Fenton will take over entire charge of the coaching until the arrival of Presley, who is now in a Vancouver hospital. Coach Lanahan will be unable to do any field coaching this season. The schedule calls for three games a week until the first of April and is one of the longest ever arranged here. The games are arranged with St. Ignatius college and the Independents of San Francisco, St. Vincent's of Los Angeles, St. Mary's of Oakland and Santa Clara.

The following telegram has been received from the New South Wales Rugby Union by President J. Morgan: "Our team now visiting Great Britain will return by way of San Francisco, first matches, terms and probable results."

The team mentioned is a representative team which is just concluding a series of matches in the British Isles and will soon return to Australia.

Dr. Angell of the athletic committee, when seen concerning the dispatch, seemed to be greatly in favor of the idea, but said the whole thing would depend on the matter of finances. He believes that with the cooperation of the athletic committee, the proposition would be faithfully considered before the idea was given up.

Murphy Grows Better.
