

EAST SIDE IMPROVEMENTS SHOW CONTINUED PROGRESS

BRIDGES MUST CLOSE

War Department to Regulate Operation — Want Structures Closed for Hour Morning and Evening.

Much encouragement is felt by the officers and members of the east side clubs relative to the matter of procuring a just regulation of the bridge draws. Attorney Thomas G. Greene gave it as his opinion in an exhaustive speech before the united clubs Tuesday evening that the law would allow the bridges to be closed at certain periods during the day if the proper methods to bring it about were adopted. The war department at Washington must be approached in the proper manner and when they have been shown the facts, said Mr. Greene, the people of the east side will win their point.

The proposal provides that the draws on all the bridges across the Willamette river at Portland should be closed for one hour in the evening and one hour in the morning, during the time when most of the people are passing to and from their work. A further regulation is proposed by Mr. Greene, which he said should be brought about, that would require the bridge tenders to keep the bridge closed 10 minutes between each opening and that it never be open at any one time for more than 10 minutes.

War Department Must Act.

The rules under which the bridge is operated now, according to Mr. Greene, are imposed by the war department alone and by no other authority and if the war department should see fit to revise those rules no one interferes. He said the time had come when a cessation of the nuisance should be brought about as was done in Chicago some years ago. He said when Mr. Greene said he was living in the windy city.

"We should send direct to the secretary of war statistics and facts regarding the situation," said Mr. Greene. "We must show the relation between the east side and the west side; we must show the population of the east side and the fact that it is largely interested in business and a professional way on the west side and that transportation must be interrupted as little as possible.

"When we show them that approximately 25,000 people pass over the four bridges every day to the 50 or 100 that pass up and down the river, they should be no difficulty in gaining our point. Really, the river traffic is insignificant compared to the automobile traffic and could be regulated without putting any restriction upon the steamboat traffic.

When I was living in Chicago

the same question came up. There were not more than 100,000 people living in Chicago at that time and there were but three bridges which it was proposed to regulate in this same way. We made our overtures direct to the secretary of war and when the figures and facts were presented as they existed we had no trouble in obtaining the concession. We must interest our senators so that they will help us and it will be easy."

W. L. Boise announced

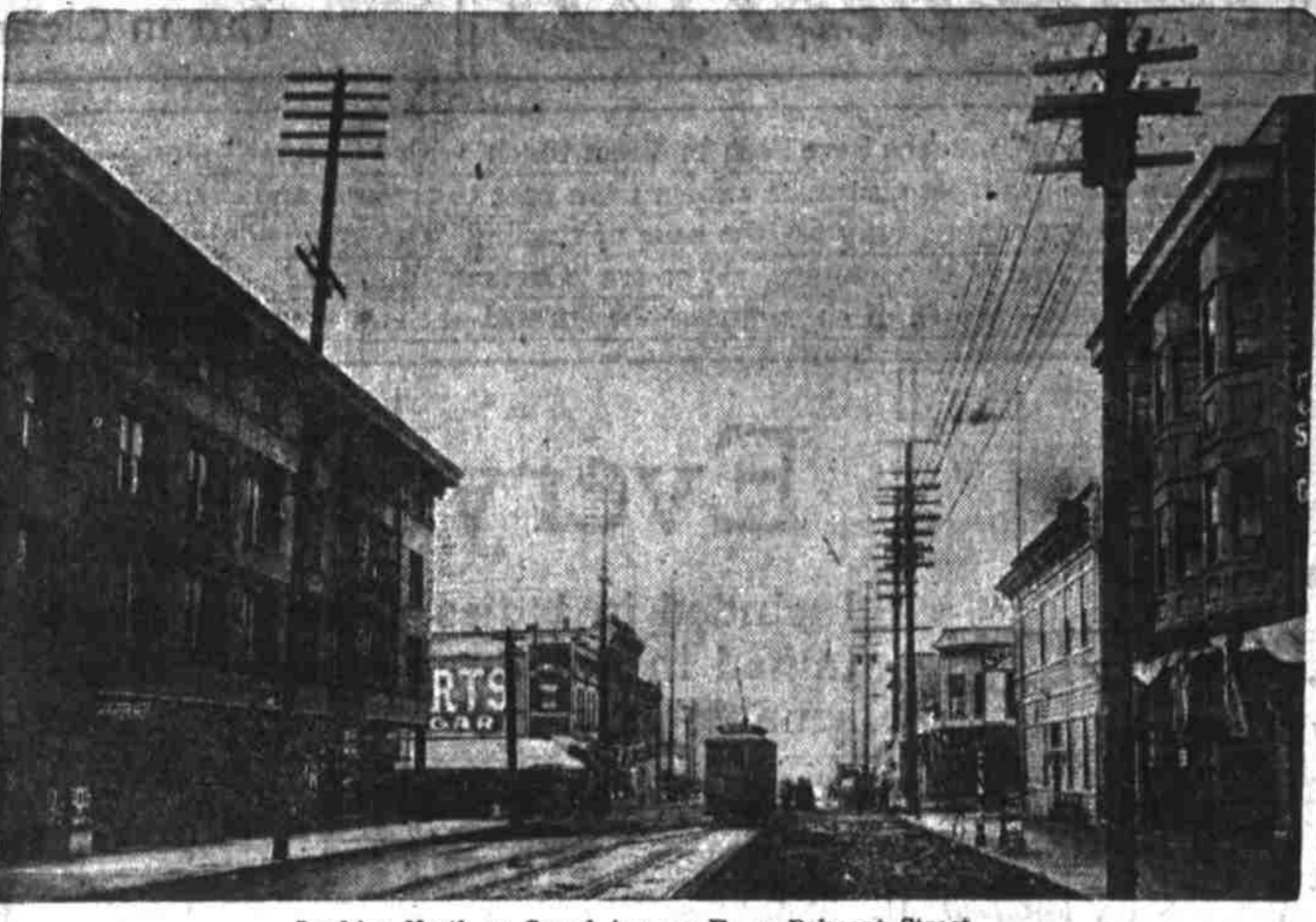
when Mr. Greene had finished, that Senator Fulton had been approached regarding the matter during his recent visit and had promised his assistance. President Josselyn of the Portland Railways has already collected some of the statistics mentioned by Mr. Greene and they are being prepared for presentation to the war department and to Senator Fulton. The chamber of commerce has also endorsed the proposition.

The east side believes that more rapid transit across the bridges is one of the most important items in the development of the east side resident districts as the nuisance of being held up on the bridges has deterred many citizens from buying property and building homes on the east side and thereby caused a general depression of realty values.

PLAN TO DOUBLE CAPACITY OF MILLS

Columbia Company's Cereal, Rapidly Growing Output, Demands More Room.

The Columbia Milling company, whose plant on East Market street, between East Second and East Third streets was put up during the past year at a cost of \$75,000, has under consideration the doubling of its mills within the next few months. This concern has built up a large trade in both flour and cereal products, and in order to keep pace with its increasing trade finds it necessary to largely increase its output. The company is preparing to make extensive improvements to its warehouse, and when this work is completed will probably take up the proposition to double the size of the mill proper.

ADDITIONAL TIME FOR SEWER WORK

Six Months More Given Contractors on Big Brooklyn Project.

Six months additional time has been granted Contractors Gebicki, Pacquet & Joplin in which to complete the big Brooklyn sewer project. This additional time gives the contractors until the latter part of April to finish the work, but it is doubtful, according to Ferdinand Joplin, if the sewer can be accepted by the city as completed at that time. It will probably take the greater part of next summer to finish the project.

River Blocks Work.

On account of the high stage of the river work had to be abandoned in the main trunk for a week or so, but has resumed again. There remains yet to be taken from the tunnel about 250 feet of the 1,500. The work of laying the brick and cement in this part of the sewer has just been started. A short distance was laid at the river end before the high water, but the workmen were forced to leave the tunnel when the water rose. The tunnel will be 10 feet in diameter on the inside when finished.

Mayor Watches Work.

The mayor and city engineer both have been faithfully watching the progress of the construction of the sewer during the past few months. Mayor Lane dons a slicker and sou'wester and a pair of gum boots and wades down through the trench every other morning or so. He says the contractors are doing good work and it is likely that the contractors will be allowed reasonable overtime. Much credit is given them for the work they are doing. The contract was let at \$250,000 and is the largest sewer contract ever let in Portland. The work has been going steadily forward for the last 18 months. The contractors assert that should weather conditions take a more favorable turn great progress could be made with the sewer. Other conditions are very favorable, two of which mentioned by Mr. Joplin are the cheap labor market and the busted state of the sand combine, both big factors in so large an undertaking.

Mrs. Quinlan Dead.

SELLWOOD BEGINS PARK CAMPAIGN

Board of Trade Urges Residents to Plant Trees in Suburbs.

In concurrence with the extensive park plans that have grown out of the movement which caused the million-dollar bond issue to be voted last June, the Sellwood board of trade has started a campaign that if carried out, will make that suburb one of the most attractive parts of the city. The first step will be to plant trees and shrubs in the streets.

Rev. D. A. Thompson is anxious that every homeowner shall assist. It is thought by those who have studied the plan that it is one of the cheapest and most effective methods of beautification that can be adopted. At least two trees are to be planted in front of every lot. The individual cost will be very small.

Cards will be distributed among the public schools from the Sellwood branch library and in every way that it is possible to get them into the hands of the citizens. A tree-planting day will be decided upon after the cards are filled out and sent in. Maples, elms, poplars or nut bearing trees will be set out and a plan adopted so that there will be a diversity of trees planted.

WILL ADOPT PLANS FOR NEW CHURCH

Plans for a new church to replace the burned Forbes Presbyterian in Albina, have been adopted by the building committee. The plans will be submitted to the congregation at a business meeting to be held in the Rodney Avenue Christian church this evening. Cost of the new building will be \$25,000. It will be a frame building but higher than the old structure so as to admit of a large gallery.

BURKHARD BUILDING SOON TO BE HOTEL

Structure Will Be Remodeled at Once Under Architect's Plans.

The Burkhard building, East Burnside street, between Union and Grand avenues, which was purchased last fall by S. A. Arata for \$135,000, is to be reconstructed, modernized and probably converted into a first-class family hotel. The owner of the property has commissioned a local architect to prepare plans and specifications of the necessary alterations to be made on the second and third floors. The plans under contemplation provide for converting the large hall at the west end of the third floor into living apartments. The rooms at the east end of the building, which have for many years been occupied by the East Side Masonic lodges will be utilized as a dining room. Many changes will have to be made in the interior of the two upper floors, requiring the expenditure of a large sum of money.
