YOUTHFUL LAW BREAKERS PUNISHED

Report Issued for 1907 Discloses Much Work Done Among the Poor.

Work of the Volunteers of America for 1907 is shown in the report prepared by the soldiers which states that 81 conversions were secured in the 408 street meetings and 349 had services held during the year. Members of the army visited 807 families where help was given aid. Temporary help was extended to 61 girls. Shelter was given to 319 men, while 334 were given meals. Poor people were given 1,433 garments of clothing.

YOUTHFUL LAW BREAKERS PUNISHED

Frank Oliver, the 17-year-old boy who stole a revolver a few days ago and pawned it because he was hungry, and who says that a policeman suggested that he "break into jail" when he questioned the bluecoat as to what he should do, was turned over to the state board of charities yesterday by the juvenile court. It was decided that no criminal charge should be pressed if Oliver seeks work and behaves himself. He says he came to Portland from The Dalles.

Three young thieves from St. Johns were sent to the detention home. With another boy they stole a number of articles last Sunday, aggregating \$100 in value. This being the first offense for one of the boys, he was permitted to go home on probation, while the other three had been in the juvenile court before. All three are under the age of 14.
