## CLASSIC BURNS RUN SATURDAY

### Coast's Biggest Stake Race Will See Some Great Sprinters Entered.

San Francisco, Jan. 20.—The famous Burns handicap, the Brooklyn handicap of the Pacific coast, will be run next Saturday at Emeryville. The big race is worth \$7,000 to the owner of the winning horse, and \$2,000 and \$1,000 respectively to the owners of second and third horses.

It is laid over the same route as the Suburban handicap, the Brooklyn handicap and other of the great sporting events of the past. In the east, and like these events, it attracts a tremendous crowd.

Paris may have its Grand Prix and London the Epsom derby, but to San Francisco there is nothing which transcends in racing importance the Burns handicap, named in honor of Dan M. Burns, vice-president of the New California Jockey club, and meant to perpetuate a memory of the noble deeds accomplished by him for the welfare of the turf upon the Pacific slope.

With clear weather prevailing Saturday a throng of 15,000 racing enthusiasts will be on hand for the running. And what a betting carnival it will be, too. It is one of the great sporting spectacles of the world to see the Burns handicap crowds toss up the gold to the bookmakers. Talk about Suburban handicaps—why, there is almost as much money wagered here on the Burns handicap.

### Arcadia Cracks Will Run.

At this time it is hard to make a selection as to the probable winner, though many good judges say either S. C. Hildreth or R. F. Carman will take the plum. The race will be run on the local and long and careful preparation on the dry course at Santa Anita, where, in training, are also Ed Trotter's star, Riffman, undoubtedly the race look to be at the mercy of one of the Los Angeles candidates.

The middle condition of the Oakland course has made it exceedingly difficult for the local trainers to condition their candidates, so, as much as the local association lates to see the Carman and Hildreth horses come up here to win big chunks of money to their credit, it looks as if nothing but an outrageous accident can deprive the trained horse from capturing the rich money bag dangling at the end of this year's Burns handicap.

### TIGHT MONEY FAILS TO SCARE ONE AUTO FIRM

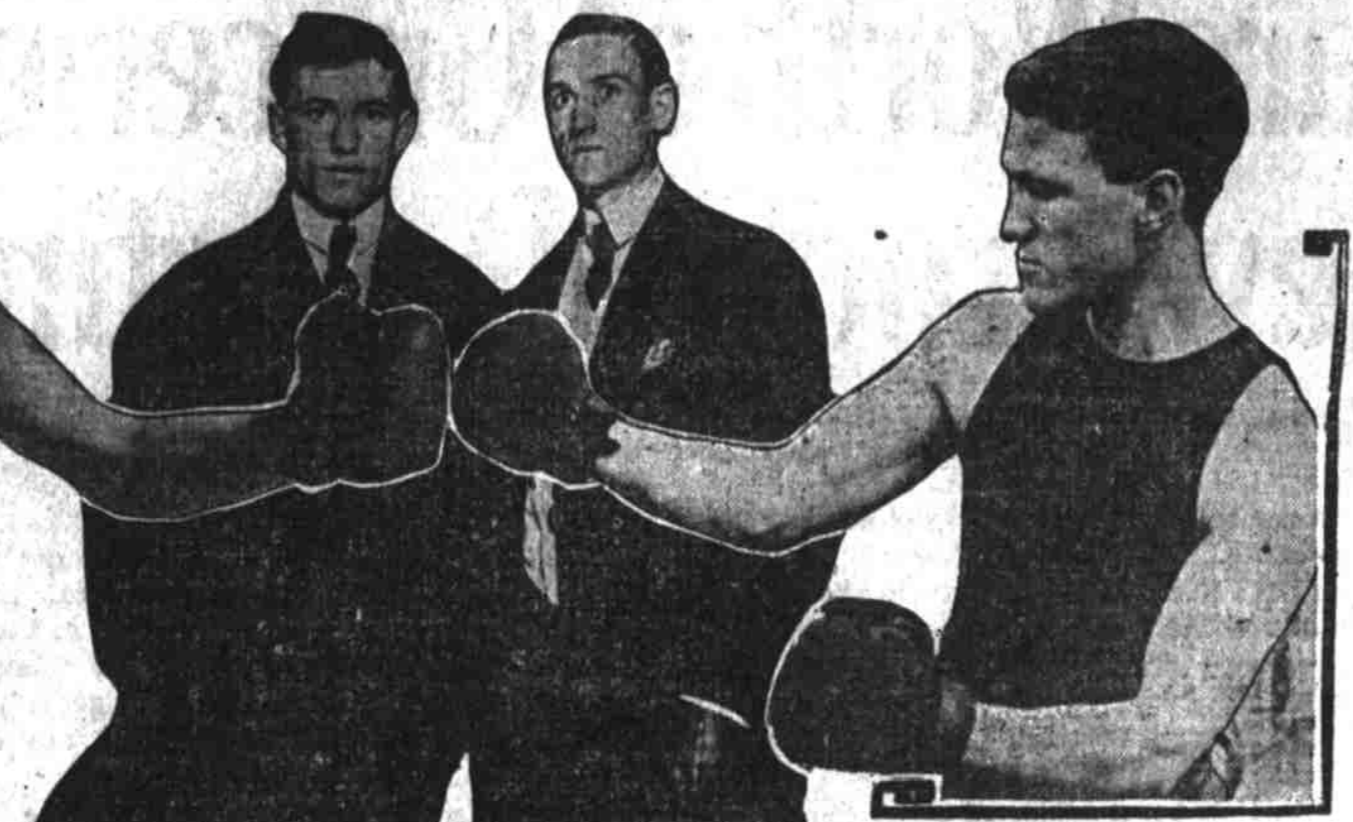

## CAPTAIN TOM BUNDY PASSES AT AGE OF 87

### Well-Known Bathhouse Proprietor and Swimming Instructor Dead.

Captain Thomas Bundy, known to a greater part of Portland's population as the proprietor of Bundy's bathhouse, on the east bank of the Willamette near Ross Island, passed away at 7 o'clock last night at the age of 87 years. The funeral will be held from the family residence, 561 Grand avenue, tomorrow afternoon.

Born in Brighton, England, May 12, 1820, Captain Bundy had a stirring career on the sea. He was a sailor in the British navy, and helped to suppress the African slave trade. He first established his residence in Buffalo, after coming to America, and worked on the Great Lakes for some time. He came to Oregon about 16 years ago and engaged in the bathhouse business until his death.

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## NEED DEFENSES AT COOS BAY

### United States Engineers Asked to Note Harbor Has No Fortifications.

Chicago, Ill., Jan. 20.—Much interest centers in the complaint of Minneapolis merchants against the Boston & Maine and other railroads, which has been set for hearing before the interstate commerce commission here today. The case involves the question whether the railroads have the right to raise rates on the shipment of goods from the east by way of the Great Lakes to Minneapolis, so as to include marine insurance.
