In the estimate of Christ life in the supremest value and highest worth. Life must be conserved ad carried to its highest terms of per and carried to its highest terms of perfection and realization, even if it demanded the cutting off of an arm or the plucking out of an eye; for what is a sightless eye to a blind life, lost in its own impenetrable darkness and night; what a maimed body to a mutilated and helpless life.

"The divinity of life was ever in his wind. The priceless treasures and value."

The priceless treasures and values of the universe were about him in the lives of little children in whom no one was concerned. The blind, the sick, the poor that were endured and neglected the common people who were enslaved and opressed; and the sinful and erring who were loathed and

shunged.
"Back of and beneath all misfortune, blind eyes and leprous bodies, palsied limbs, repulsive immorality, poverty, ignorance and sorrow were lives; sparks of immortality struck out of and from the divine; lives which he saw and prized and came to save, for life is the owning act, the impartation of God; se breathing into clay of the divine ego and the priceless pearl which Christ came to discover and polish and make beautiful and reclaim from the decay and waste, filth, defilement and debris the sin ruin of the ages.

Must Live a Life. "Man's love and passion for life is but the response of God's love and ap-preciation of life. To save, conserve, perfect and impart life is worthy the power and love of the Almighty, the reation of worlds and the purpose of

countless ages.
"No min is placed here to make a No man is placed here to make a fortupe, to succeed in business, to be great or honored or scholarly or powerful; but every man is bound to make a life, to live his life, to enter into the glory and nobility of living and being, for life alone is real, the true value in time and eternity. Life in its essence and quality the intrinsic worth for which all mere things exist and that which gives value and sense to all crewhich gives value and sense to all creation. The world, heaven and God wait upon and attend the destiny of human life.

We are still estimating life in terms of food and raiment, position, goods and homes. Let us lift up our voices and protest against this degradation of Things can never constitute a life. No circumstances or environment or bedily condition should affect or defeat the triumphs of life and being.

UNION OF CHURCHES.

First Christian Congregation Discusses Feasibility of Idea.

"I apprehend that a union of the dif

represent that a union of the dif-ferent branches of the Protestant church will first be effected. The Cumberland Presbyterians and the Northern Presby-terians have already united. It remains for the Methodists to unite and for the different branches of the Baptist church to enter upon unity of action, as well as the various branches of the Congregationalists. This union of the Christian denominations cannot be brought about under a human head. It must be brought about under Jesus Christ.

"A number of things make such a union desirable. Division has ever been a cause of ill will and bitterness. Read church history as far back as you like

church history as far back as you like, and you will see the unscrupulous methods resorted to in order that some sect might bring its particular ecclesiastical notion of things into prominence.

"A man may or may not believe many things, and yet be saved. I don't want you to exercise any authority as to what I shall believe, ner do I wish to bring authority to bear upon you to compel you to believe as I do. There are many members of the Haptist church whose ideas are more nearly in accord with my own than are some of the members of my own church. We are all Christians."
