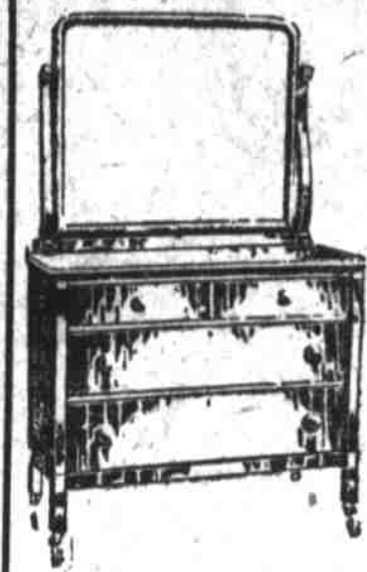
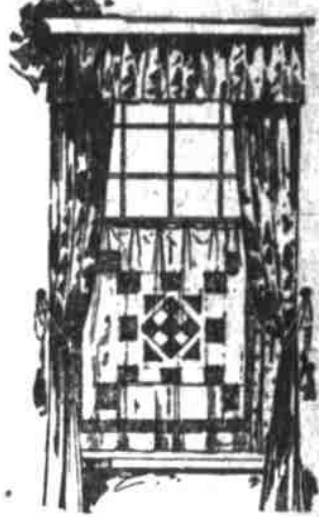

HARD BLOW TO OPIUM FIENDS

Within Month Law Prohibiting Drug in Philippines Is Effective.

(United Press Special Wire.)
Washington, Jan. 20.—Within a little over a month the law prohibiting the importation of opium into the Philippines will become effective. A large quantity of opium is consumed in the islands, mainly by the Chinese, but the harmful habit of opium smoking has been rapidly extending among the native Filipinos, and even among the Americans.

Congress has passed an act intended to correct the evil, but there is doubt of the ability of the confirmed opium user to abandon the drug, and a considerable agitation has been taking place in the Philippines with the object of securing an extension of time permitted for the stoppage of the traffic.

NEW OUTBREAK OF HOLY ROLLERISM

Horsewhips, Tar, Feathers and Rails Await Fanatics at Woodville.

Grants Pass, Or., Jan. 20.—Trouble is brewing at the little town of Woodville, eight miles from this city, because of an attempt upon the part of a few religious fanatics to start a series of meetings of the Holy Roller type. It is said the meetings are led by one of the followers of the notorious Creffield, who was killed in Seattle over a year ago by a brother of one of the "apostles" dupes.

Last summer several meetings of the Holy Roller sort but under a different name, were held at Woodville. The real nature of the meetings finally became known to the better citizens of the town and tar and feathers were threatened. The leaders took the hint and fled. Salutary But Long Neglected Ordinances Are to Be Revivified.

Salem, Or., Jan. 20.—This is the day set for enforcement of all neglected city ordinances. Mayor Rodgers began his work of cleaning up the city morally by calling on a notorious poker camp in the side room of a State street saloon, and after witnessing several games of "penny ante" with a \$20 limit, notified the proprietor to close the shop or stand prosecution. Panic reigned in the other card rooms where games for money have been running for some months freely, and all took to cover. It is not expected that private poker games behind locked doors can be abolished, but all public gambling is to be put under the ban. CRUISER CALIFORNIA MAKES GOOD RECORD

Sag Francisco, Cal., Jan. 20.—The cruiser California steamed into port yesterday at the end of her final trial cruise.

The California has more than come up to her contract stipulations, and in every way has earned her title of "The Pride of the Pacific Squadron."

She cuts the waves as far up the coast as Cape Blanco, Oregon, then plowed around and flew back to her home port full of honors. The contract called for a speed of 23 knots per hour for a continued four-hour run under forced draught, and she had averaged that and a good fraction over.

Each of the 15 guns of her main battery had been fired three times, and the guns, mounts and batteries had proven perfect. The California is the first cruiser of her class to make good on her trial trip.

SUSPECTED SHEEP IN BENTON COUNTY

Chase Varmints Into Lane and Lose Them, Benton Ranchers Say.

Monroe, Or., Jan. 20.—United States Inspector H. Silverwood of the bureau of animal industry is in this section looking after several bands of sheep that were reported to be infected. The federal government is working with state and county officials to enforce the dipping laws and clean up all bands of sheep which give the slightest indications of being infected. Mr. Silverwood imparts information regarding the construction of dipping vats, the method of dipping which will secure the best results, as well as the handling and care of livestock.

It is more than likely that quite a lot of dip will be brought here before many days.

KICK ON COYOTE HUNTERS OF LAKE

Inspect Rosenthal's show store windows and get busy.

Monroe, Or., Jan. 20.—There are several sore spots in this vicinity on account of the way the coyote hunters of Lane county are operating.

The varmints are started in that county, chased across Houck mountain into Benton county, and frequently the trail is lost on this side of the hill, so that the sheep killer is left to ply his trade among the bands owned here. Since there are no dogs in this vicinity that are trained to chase these animals, it works a hardship on the Benton ranchers. Hence steps are being taken for a donation of a fund sufficient to secure the destruction of coyotes in this part of the country.
