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Magnificent Structure of Canadian Pacific Thrown Open to Public—One Million Dollars Expended in Construction.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Victoria, B. C., Jan. 20.—The magnificent new hotel of the Canadian Pacific railroad was opened here today. The hotel cost \$1,000,000.

THE ENGLISH CAPITAL ON THE PACIFIC

The English capital on the Pacific is a charming city of about 40,000 inhabitants, situated at the southern extremity of Vancouver island. It is connected with Vancouver on the mainland, the terminus of the Canadian Pacific railway, by a ferris wheel of about four hours on the Canadian Pacific company's beautiful steamer Princess Victoria. The city overlooks the straits of Fuca to the Pacific, and beyond the Gulf of Georgia is the mainland. The climate is that of the south of England, and the city is peculiarly English in all its characteristics.
