

FIVE CHARTERS COULDN'T MOVE BRIMS OR LEGS

Russian Bark Albyn Will Carry Lumber to South Africa.

BRITISH STEAMER WILL LOAD WHEAT

Two Norwegian Steamers Added to List of Vessels En Route to Load Lumber—American Schooner J. H. Lunsman Fixed for Business.

Four new charters were announced this morning, one for grain and three for lumber. The British steamer Tweeddale will come from San Francisco to carry wheat to Europe, while the Russian bark Albyn, the American schooner J. H. Lunsman and the Norwegian steamer Haldis will arrive for lumber. It was also announced last night that the Norwegian steamer Thyra will be here soon to load lumber for Port Pirie, Australia.

The Russian bark Albyn and the American schooner J. H. Lunsman were chartered by the Pacific Export Lumber company for the Portland steaming mills to carry approximately 5,000 tons of wheat to Europe. She recently reached San Francisco with a cargo of coal. The combined cargoes of the lumber carriers will measure about 7,000,000 feet.
