

ALL LIARS, SAYS CONBOY

Saloonkeeper Calls Everyone Who Testifies Against Him a Falsifier—Councilmen Expose Themselves to Visitors at Hearing.

Conboy testified that C. V. Porter, who told interesting stories about Conboy using "love language" over the telephone also lied before the committee, according to Conboy, save Conboy himself. He also swore pure and undefiled before the members in the display of unembellished truth. He stated further that he would be able to prove his statements by his sister and his bartender.

HUBBY TIRES OF COMPANY ASKS STREET VACATION

Lumber Firm's Solution to Problem Which Induced Mayor's Message.

In support of its petition to the city council for the vacation of certain streets on the east side, the Immanuel Lumber company has sent a letter to the members of the council explaining the company's position in the matter. The petition asks that portions of East First, East Second, East Third, East Sherman, East Lincoln, East Grant, East Caruthers and Division be vacated for the benefit of the company.

In connection with the company's letter and petition the councilmen will also receive a communication from Mayor Lane calling their attention to the fact that the company is trespassing on city property and should be evicted before they pay rent. The company's letter follows:

"Through the columns of the daily papers it has been announced that the mayor has directed a communication to you about the matter of the vacation of certain platted ground occupied by the Immanuel Lumber company and a part of its sawmill plant. He suggests as an alternative the leasing of the premises to this company at a fixed rental for a term of years, and further suggests that this company compensate the city for the past use of the premises by the payment of a further rental, and by way of calling attention to the importance of the transaction, figures the area in square feet and the market value in dollars."

"As a first proposition, our petition on file set out the fact that when the plat of addition was filed in 1869 it contained no dedication of the premises as streets and no recognition of the public or ourselves and a large portion of the premises is in a deep slough, the bounds of which were distinctly traced on the plat."

"Secondly, in answer to the suggestion to rent the streets. The law itself in connection with such a proposal and bars negotiations of this nature. We are advised and we opine your city attorney will so advise you. The city cannot rent a street for a term of years, could not lease the same to a private party. When a street is dedicated by sufficient words of dedication, the owner of the property will relinquish the title to the ground dedicated and the public simply have a right of passage over the street. The owner does not part with his title, but simply grants the public a right-of-way over the same. The city can not more sell or lease a street than it could sell or lease the Willamette river. The city cannot even occupy a street to the exclusion of the public."

"In the city of Portland the blocks are so small and the streets so numerous that manufacturing plants, such as the Immanuel Lumber company, find themselves materially handicapped for want of space and oftentimes the public interests would be served much more to the advantage if the city streets than by tenaciously or otherwise insisting that in the preservation of streets as originally platted the only safeguard of the people's rights and liberty."

JAMES MUST GO BACK TO PRISON

Habit of Passing Bad Checks Too Strong to Be Resisted.

E. B. James, who has a penchant for bad checks which his friends later have made good, will go to the penitentiary because of conduct breaking the parole which was granted by Circuit Judge Sears, Deputy District Judge Cleland yesterday, where his attorney pleaded for "one more chance," but the court said the facts in the matter were conclusive and ordered the parole revoked.

James was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary on the charge of obtaining money under false pretenses by Judge Sears, after the charge had been reduced from forgery in order to permit the parole privileges. Since then he has passed several bad checks, always making the excuse that some one was about to deposit money for him and he thought the money was there. Haney said that he had personally attended to making good at least a dozen checks drawn by James.

James is a contracting painter and has made money on large contracts. He has a wife and three children, and it was suggested that his check-making may be a mania. Judge Cleland said that if there were any question on the point of sanity, raised in the proper way, he would direct an examination to be made, but at that time he could see nothing to do but revoke the parole.

John Wynne, charged with the murder of W. H. Du Puy, called to court to plead, but his attorney asked for further time and was granted until Friday afternoon.

James Widen accused of larceny, changed his plea from not guilty to guilty and the case was postponed one week to allow time for the arrival of his mother.

J. J. Chofut pleaded not guilty to the charge of attempting to rob D. Nicholas Anderson was granted until Friday to answer the charge of attempting to commit burglary at the home of W. L. Dalton on thirteenth street.

POSTMASTER AT MILWAUKIE DIES

Funeral of C. K. Ballard, veteran of the civil war and postmaster at Milwaukie, who died yesterday, was held this afternoon at 2 o'clock from the residence of his wife, Mrs. D. M. Ballard, at the residence of Riverview Lodge, I. O. F. Mr. Ballard had been ill for several weeks past. He was 72 years old, having been born in Illinois. When the war broke out he enlisted in the Fifteenth Illinois Volunteer infantry and served throughout the war with a creditable record. He had been postmaster of Milwaukie for the last five years.

Charles Ballard has been put in charge of the Milwaukie post-office by the postmen pending the appointment of a new postmaster.
