Funeral of W. Q. Adams was held yesterday afternoon and interment was at the Lone Fir cemetery. Rev. Charles Theobald officiated. Mr. Adams died at the Good Samaritan hospital Tuesday, January 21, as the result of a second operation for blood poisoning.

Frank A. Clark, formerly steward of the Portland Commercial club and later manager of the Rock Island club, has become manager of the Savoy, Seattle's new 12-story hotel of 210 rooms built at a cost of \$750,000 by S. Sweeney.

William A. Haley will have to serve three years in the state penitentiary for his bold exploit in stealing 20 tons of structural iron from a vacant lot.

Efforts to pass the crippled vehicle tax on its way through the council were blocked yesterday and the measure was referred back to the license committee with instructions to prepare a copy of the ordinance together with the one initiated by Councilman Menefee.

The city council passed a resolution yesterday afternoon authorizing Mayor Lane to appoint a committee of three to confer with the officers of the county court and the committee of the organized charitable associations, to consider the proposition of a public workhouse to be operated by the city and county.

Following the request of a large number of east side push clubs for a city rock crusher. Councilman Rushlight introduced an ordinance in the city council yesterday afternoon providing for a crusher to cost \$10,000. The measure was referred to the ways and means committee. The rock crushers are expected to relieve the crushed rock famine in Portland.

Ruth Willet, the 12-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George T. Willet, died yesterday at the Robert-Curtis, after a short illness. Her death was sudden and unexpected. She was a favorite at the hotel and her father and mother are almost prostrated. Funeral will be held from Holman's chapel Saturday afternoon.

The city council granted Curator George H. Hines of the Oregon Historical society permission to hang the portrait of Ben Holladay upon the north wall of the north light well in the city hall. Permission was also granted Mr. Hines to display a large picture owned by Captain Thomas Mountain, in the light well.

City Attorney Kavanaugh was granted further time by the city council yesterday to report on the fender ordinance. He was expected to report yesterday, but owing to the great amount of work in his office he is unable to prepare the measure.

Councilman Driscoll introduced an ordinance in the council yesterday recommending that the street car company be compelled to furnish seats for all passengers or else carry them free of charge. The ordinance was referred to the committee on judiciary and elections and City Attorney Kavanaugh.

Amos Bigham was arrested yesterday in Seapooose on a charge of wife beating. He was arraigned in Justice Reid's court yesterday afternoon and released on the deposit of \$50 cash bail. Deputies Sheriff and Leonard made the arrest. Trial has not yet been set.

The city council yesterday appropriated \$2,500 for the purchase of mooring buoys to be placed in the harbor. The buoys were recommended by Harbor-master Speier, who urged that the port's anchorage facilities were insufficient for the large fleet that calls here.

Announcements are out for a concert to be given at St. Helen's Hall Thursday evening of next week, at 8 o'clock. The artists will be Miss Marjorie Miller, violinist, and Mrs. Goodwin Thatcher, pianist, a recent arrival. Miss Beebe will be the accompanist.
