TELL OREGON WONDERS AT SEATTLE'S FAIR

Portland Chamber Will Establish Headquarters in State's Building.

An effort will be made by Secretary E. C. Giltner, of the Portland chamber of commerce, to secure establishment of headquarters for the chamber in the Oregon building at the Alaska-Yukon exposition. The intention is to circulate through this medium a vast amount of Oregon literature that has been approved by the chamber and is fairly representative of the whole state.

"My idea was to have a very large supply of literature about Oregon. The plan would include a directory system of cooperation with the Portland chamber of commerce exhibit here, and every visitor who called at the Oregon building at the exposition would be given directions and card of introduction to the Portland chamber exhibit, which he could inspect upon reaching Portland.

"After the exposition is over we should be able to secure the larger part of the Oregon exhibit there, to be brought to Portland for the exhibit here, the Portland chamber of commerce could handle this work in the most comprehensive and effective way. It would be necessary for us to have a very large supply of literature about Oregon.

GALLSTONES SELL FOR \$14 AN OUNCE

Chinese Doctors Buy Them in Quantities for Mysterious Purpose.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Tacoma, Jan. 24.—A very peculiar traffic going on from packing-houses of this country to China and Japan and which few people know anything about is the exportation of gallstones taken from cattle slaughtered. These yellow concretions come from the gall bladder of diseased cattle and are dried and sold to Chinese physicians at \$14 an ounce. The stones are of various sizes, but after they are dried and ready for market are exceedingly light, it requiring 10 or 15 stones to weigh an ounce. Neither Thomas Carsten, president of the Carsten Packing company here, nor physicians of Tacoma, know to what uses the product is put by the orientals. As the stones consist mainly of cholesterol, some physicians talked with believe they are used in the manufacture of cosmetics. There is another theory that the Chinese use them as medicine, though doctors here know of no medicinal quality they contain.

BOARD TO DECIDE WHY KOSHER CAUSED COHEN TO HIT LEIBOVITZ

A sort of Hague peace conference in miniature is to be called into existence to settle the differences between Mendel Cohen and S. Leibovitz. Four questions will be before the court of arbitration for final settlement, viz.: 1.—What is kosher? 2.—Was S. Leibovitz right in telling M. Cohen that the said Cohen had not even a superficial knowledge of the preparation of kosher? 3.—Whether right or wrong, was M. Cohen justified in swatting Leibovitz on the jaw? 4.—What punishment, if any, shall be meted out to either or both parties to the late unpleasantness?"

Counsel for Leibovitz—T. J. Geisler. Something more than a week ago Leibovitz and Cohen engaged in a dispute in the First Street synagogue relative to the proper preparation of kosher. The dispute developed into a personal encounter and Leibovitz had Cohen arrested on a charge of battery. In spite of all the efforts of the properly constituted authorities to have the case brought to trial in the police court, the matter has hung fire. First one side desired a continuance and then the other. In the meantime special counsel fees were piling up, but the deadlock remained unbroken. MINING ENGINEERS' REPORTS

These excerpts are from reports on the property made by Mining Engineers H. E. Peterson and J. P. Stampher, on two separate occasions and at different dates and months:

BY J. P. STAMPHER.
"I found in both tunnels a number of ore 'stringers,' all of which trended in a northeasterly and southwesterly direction. These ledges all dip in a southeasterly direction, near the dividing line near Butte Boy No. 2 and 4. In all my experience as a mining engineer I have never known it to fall that when stringers are found running as do these, they eventually run together, increasing in width with depth, all converging toward a solid body of ore. I believe that a little ledge anywhere from 15 to 25 feet will be found. At the end of the west tunnel I took a sample of the stringer that assayed 398 to the ton. There was an 18-inch stringer in the west end of the tunnel, which looked very rich, but I did not assay it. I was informed, however, that this ore assayed 2,500 to the ton. At the end of the east tunnel I took a sample across a 2 1/2-foot stringer, worth \$600 to \$700 to the ton. Colvig for the Legislature. Grants Pass, Or., Jan. 24.—Ex-Consul George W. Colvig, who was stationed

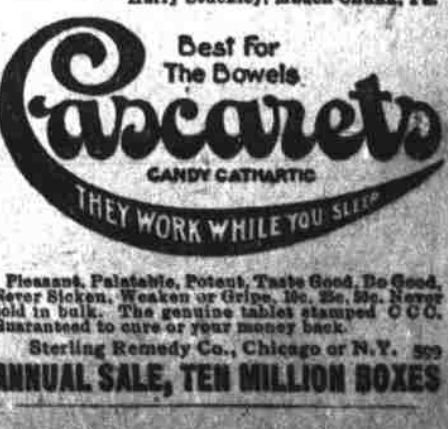
