

CALL BURBANK CHICAGO WILL MATURE FAKER AND UNEMPLOYED

United States Experts Condemn Tale of Spineless Cactus as Wild Dream. Prominent Men Raise Funds to Help Tide Over Hard Times.

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, Jan. 24.—The latest bulletin of the United States department of agriculture charges Luther S. Burbank with being a nature faker. According to this bulletin, entitled "The Cactus as Food for Man," and edited by David Griffiths, assistant agriculturalist, and by R. F. Hare, government chemist at the New Mexico College of Agriculture, Luther S. Burbank has not succeeded in producing a desert cactus entirely free from spines; nor is the Burbank cactus suitable for a food for man, as he claims.

THAW EPISODE DUDELY NIPPED

Defense in a Washington Case Shut Out When New Law Is Upheld.

Olympia, Wash., Jan. 24.—The law passed by the last legislature governing the defense of insanity in criminal trials was upheld by the superior court in the trial of W. D. Sloan, charged with attempting to kill C. E. Mallory. The ruling of Judge Linn apparently will prevent the defense getting the "moral law" feature of the case to the jury. Sloan shot and wounded Mallory as a result of a quarrel in which Sloan's 13-year-old daughter. The shooting took place at Tenino last August.

VICTIM OF SUITTER'S BULLET PUT ON TRIAL

Herman Burkhard Charged With Disorderly Conduct on Night of Shooting.

Herman Burkhard was placed on trial in the police court this morning on a charge of disorderly conduct. The charge grows out of an incident that occurred several months ago and which finally resulted in Burkhard being shot and seriously wounded by Patrolman Suttler. According to the testimony given in court today Suttler was called to Park street in the morning in the early morning by citizens who informed him that Burkhard was abusing his wife. When he arrived on the scene the officer found the man and woman engaged in an altercation and placed Burkhard under arrest. The latter tried to escape from the officer and a scuffle took place that resulted in Burkhard getting away. He ran down the street, followed by the officer, and was finally shot.

(Continued from Page One.) about the complaints which Putnam had made against the illegal fences. The witness said Hall told him if the complaint was put in the right name by Putnam that it would have to be filed from Hall's office. The witness further said it had been his understanding after his visit to Hall that no action would be taken against him unless Putnam made his complaint in proper legal shape. At that time he did not know that Hendricks had seen Hall, but he did know that Putnam had made a map of the fences and sent it to the district attorney's office. Hendricks had told him of the map and that he would see to see Hall about the danger of prosecution.

Money Dates Into History

At this point Mr. Heney began to delve into the past political history of the state. He asked Mr. Steiwer whether a senatorial battle was on at that time and who the candidates had been. The witnesses said that the two principal aspirants had been George W. McBride and H. W. Corbett, and that he had supported Corbett. "Was Mr. Hall interesting himself in the contest?" Mr. Heney asked. Mr. Steiwer said that Hall had been around the legislature a good deal of the time. "Was it generally known who Hall was interested in?" Mr. Heney insisted, but Judge Webster objected to the question, contending that general knowledge was not competent testimony. "Oh, very well," said Mr. Heney, "we will subpoena a lot of them to tell you what Hall was interested in." He then turned to Secretary Rittenhouse and sent him out to issue the subpoenas. "Who was elected?" continued Mr. Heney, and the witness said Senator Mitchell. "Who was the other senator at that time?" continued Mr. Heney. The witness said Joseph Simon, after which Mr. Heney drew from him that he was a member of the Simon wing of the party and had always supported men of that faction. "In 1903 were you a member of the legislature?" asked Mr. Heney, jumping two years in time. The witness admitted the fact and in answer to further questions said he supported T. T. Gear, then H. W. Scott, and at last had changed to C. W. Fulton. He also said Hall had been at the time and that he had told the witness he was interested in the candidacy of Senator Fulton. The prosecutor then drew out that Steiwer voted for Fulton on about the last ballot, and that George Brownell had been president of the senate and a supporter of Fulton. F. May had also been a member of the senate at that time. The witness then testified that he had employed F. E. Mays as the attorney for the Butte Creek company about the time that Special Agent Dixon had made his investigation and was preparing to make his report. After having the witness identify a number of letters written by Hall during the year 1904, which will be introduced later in the case, Mr. Heney went back to Senator Fulton and brought him into the case as an advocate of nomination on the part of the district attorney. "Did you receive a letter from Senator Fulton during 1902 in relation to this fencing matter?" Mr. Heney asked the witness. Judge Webster objected to the question, contending that nothing Butte could have written to Steiwer could affect the case regarding Hall. The witness then testified that Mr. Heney, breaking in on the remarks of Judge Webster, "and got a promise from him not to bring criminal prosecution against Steiwer, and if Hall authorized Fulton to advise Steiwer that there would be no criminal prosecution against him or his company, if he did these things it would affect the issue, I take it." Judge Hunt suggested that Fulton might have been the bearer of a message and allowed the question to be asked. Steiwer said he had received the letter.

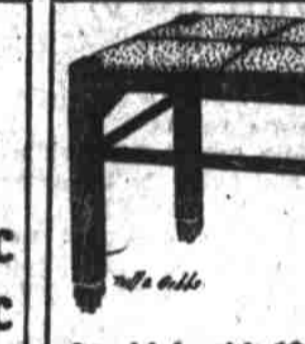
