Statement, Popular Election of Senators, River Improvement and Tariff Revision.

H. M. Cake has announced himself a candidate for the Republican nomination for United States senator to succeed Senator Fulton now running for renomination and reelection. As predicted in The Journal Sunday last, Mr. Cake will make his campaign on a platform endorsing the principles of Statehood No. 1, the direct election of senators by the people and not by the legislatures, for river and harbor improvements and a revision of the tariff. While his platform has not yet been definitely announced the position to be taken by Mr. Cake is well known through his attitude of two years ago when he ran a close second to Jonathan Bourn, the successful candidate for election.
