GANNS SAYS PACKY CAN WHIP NELSON

Colored Champion Declares Stockyards Boy Champion of the Lightweights.

New York, Jan. 25.—Joe Gann says that Packy McFarland is the legitimate lightweight champion of the world. The colored boxer informed Harry Gilmore, McFarland's manager, that he had no desire to fight again and was through with the gloves except in exhibitions.

Gann regrets that he did not remain in the ring in favor of the stockyards lad and explains that he had no idea what a great little fighter the Irishman was when he handed the lightweight crown to George Menzies.

Gann says he stands ready to bet \$5,000 that McFarland can whip Nelson and posted \$100 today to be correct if he does not make good his assertion providing Nelson accepts the bet. "I think this is a favor to McFarland is the best of the lightweights, and to back up my judgment stand ready to bet Nelson \$5,000 that Packy can beat him. McFarland is the only one of these good boys that can make 133 pounds ring-side, and I regret very much that I relinquished the title to Menzies, who is too big for the class."

When asked what he would do if Nelson happened to beat McFarland, Joe laughed and said there was not much danger of that.

"We are ready to close with Nelson this night," Harry Gilmore, manager for McFarland, Nelson has repeatedly said that he did not care to fight Packy because of the close friendship and intimacy between them but when it comes down to dollars Packy will not let his friendship for the Irishman stand in the way, and he and Nelson are fighters in the same division, and that, as both have championship aspirations, it is essential that they meet and determine the question of supremacy between them."

DOLAN POSTS MONEY FOR MILL WITH DAVIS

Kid Ervin's Charge Will Meet Dalles Boxer on Any Terms.

Jack Dolan is willing to meet E. N. Davis, The Dalles boxer, before The Dalles Athletic club, and this morning posted the \$50 forfeit required by Davis to guarantee his appearance in the ring any time within the next month.

In putting up five golden eagles with Tommy Sullivan this morning, Dolan, through his manager, Kid Ervin, agreed to go not less than 135 rounds with Davis, and by the terms permitted him to enter the ring at 140 pounds. Dolan's fighting weight is 135 pounds, but he was willing to concede five pounds to the man up the river.

Dolan has a good record. He has been fighting the past two years in California, and won from Willie Canole in the fourth round of a 19 round bout. His other fight of importance was with Kid George, whom he beat in two rounds at Maryland.

Dolan has been under the wing of Ervin for the past three months, and the former Portland boxer is taking him north to meet some of the fast men on the sound and in the ring. He thinks the boy will be a winner with a little more experience.

Ervin once fought with Davis, and says Dolan's opponent is a fast man, but does not apprehend defeat for his protégé. So Ervin will make Monday the forfeit and arrange the match that he would have put up the money yesterday but for a popular flake superstition that Friday is an unlucky day to begin fight arrangements.

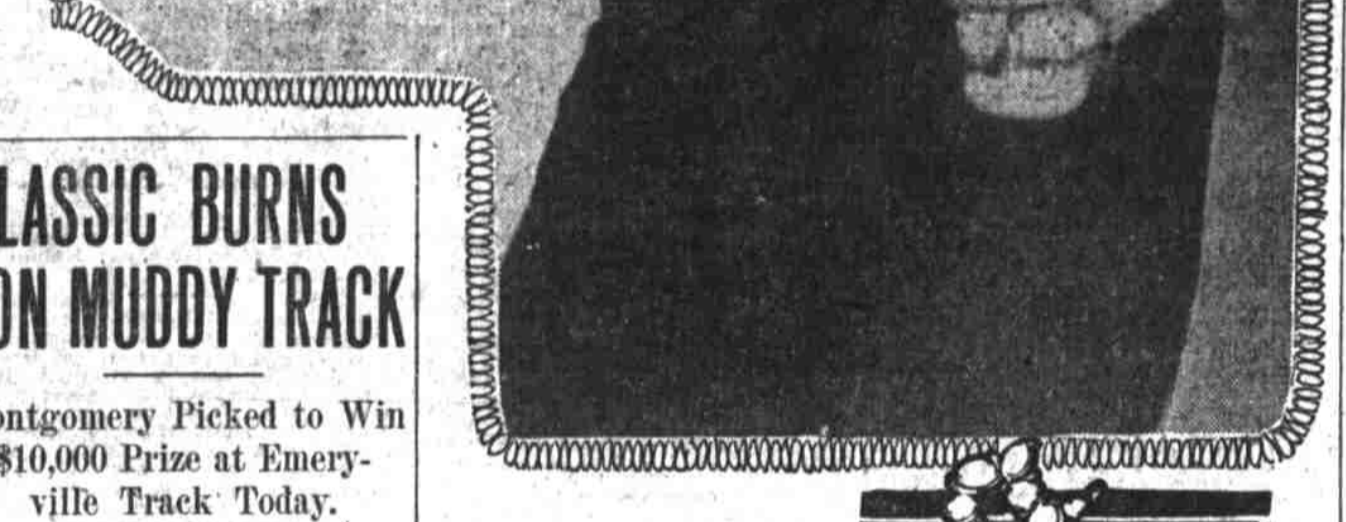

CLASSIC BURNS ON MUDDY TRACK

Montgomery Picked to Win \$10,000 Prize at Emeryville Track Today.

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, Jan. 25.—On a track ankle deep with mud the great Burns handicap, the Pacific coast's turf classic, will be run this afternoon at Emeryville.

Twelve and perhaps 13 horses are expected to go to the post to contend for the \$10,000 prize and despite the condition of the track a sensational race is looked for. The very condition of the track has added interest to the event, as it has increased the uncertainty of the outcome.
