If you're longing to be a child again, just for a night, go up to the Hellig and see "The Gingerbread Man."

The metamorphosis from the dignity of long trousers to the ease of kilts is a pleasing thing to contemplate. You start in and are somewhat peeved to think that you have been taken in by a child's play and that you are too old to have this comical remembrance of your Mother Goose.

In the next 15 minutes you begin to say, with a warming of the wrinkles of your heart, "My, what a nice play for children this would be."

Ten minutes later, when the Fairy Queen comes dancing out, it's all over. There is no longer any question of sensations. All you really think about is that it's a nice play for you.

Yes—and the songs are well sung. It doesn't sound probable, of course. It is asking too much of any one to believe it. But Mabel Day, who is the Mazie Bon Bon of the play, has a rather exceptional voice—a very clear and very sweet soprano of more than usual range and power. She's a frail looking girl and you wonder where all the voice comes from, but it is there and it is real music.

"The Gingerbread Man" is a musical hodge-podge, with much good nonsense in it, a lot of opportunities for the large if not handsome collection of chorus girls to dance and prousette about and for the principals to show how entertaining they can be when they are in the play.

Fred J. Nice is the Gingerbread Man and is very good in the part. His coming to life in the confectioner's window is excellent and his contorted acts are remarkable. James McElhron is very funny as the Good Fairy. He is a statuesque male, garbed in a blond wig and a crown of more than usual range and power.

"Milk White Flag" at Baker. That Miss Marion Barney isn't absolutely friendless so far as Baker audiences are concerned was pretty well demonstrated yesterday afternoon when upon several occasions during the performance of "A Milk White Flag," the leading woman was given ovations that must have been born of a wounded feeling that may have resulted from last week's happenings. 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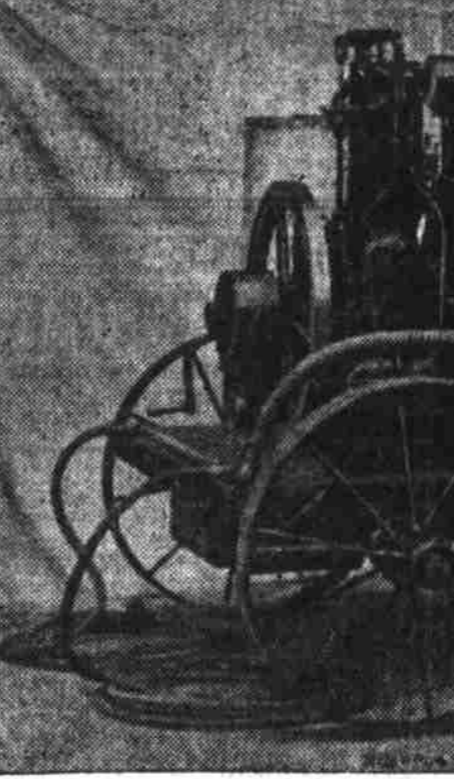
