

WAR AMONG MINISTERS

Baker City Parsons Divided on Methods of Fighting Vice—Dr. Hayden Says Dealing in Dirty Rumor Is Wrong.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Baker City, Or., Jan. 29.—War in the ranks of the Baker City Ministers' association appears to be brewing as a result of the circular recently thrown broadcast throughout this place in which Mayor Johns and other officers of the city and county were severely arraigned in the name of the organized parsons. Dr. F. L. Hayden, pastor of the Presbyterian church, has fired the first gun in the approaching battle by publicly censuring the man, without giving his name, who prepared the circular.

According to Dr. Hayden, the ministers agreed to circulate some denunciation of the officers in nameless form, but were not allowed to examine and pass on the dossier before it was printed. The Presbyterian minister expresses his disapproval of strong language employed by the author of the circular and a majority of the local ministers are expected to follow his example.

They are a number of the ministers who will prove "standpatters," and will back up the author of the handbills from start to finish. With the association divided against itself a warm controversy is expected.

Outlining his position in the affair, Dr. Hayden said, "I am heartily in favor of the war on an issue and compelling the officials whose duty it is made by statutory enactment to enforce the law, or in case they continue to refuse to do their duty to create such a sentiment here as shall hereafter make it impossible for them or their men to stripe to gain hold office in Baker City or county. I believe most heartily in placing the responsibility of the present condition of things upon these men by publicly exposing their official acts."

"But I do not believe any body of Christian men can within the right of their calling believe and compelling the matters of petty, dirty rumors. I do not believe that a minister of Christ is ever warranted in descending into the arena of private and public gossip, even in the cause of a great moral reform. This I state as a matter of personal conviction. Great issues can be well fought upon the high ground of noble appeal to right, of fearless exposure of wrong, of courageous demand for official rectitude, of earnest presentation of facts and the evidence of official dereliction, and by the use of such judicial remedies as lie within the reach of every person of upright mind and great civic body. One may do all this in the spirit of the truest kindness. Such a battle conducted in this manner it appears to their innate sense of justice."

"Upon this ground I stand as a Christian citizen and a minister of the church. Fully expecting that the paper when prepared would be of this nature, I gave my consent to its publication by authority of the ministerial association. Personally, I greatly regret that in our zeal we did not take counsel of wisdom and good judgment."

MILWAUKEE WORK IN EASTERN WASHINGTON

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Rock Lake, Wash., Jan. 29.—Milwaukee surveyors are running a spur to the O. R. & N. at St. John that they may unload 5,000,000 feet of lumber to be used in construction work at this point. Men and teams are more plentiful than here and the cost of hauling lumber and wages are considerably lower. Formerly it was a hard matter to get men and teams a day. Plenty of men are now obtainable at \$1.50 a day.

Rancher Missing Two Months.

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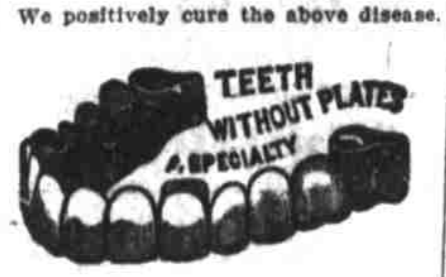

GRAND MEETING OF FRUIT MEN

Fully 250 Northwest Growers at Walla Walla—Fine Displays.

Walla Walla, Wash., Jan. 29.—With 250 of the most prominent fruit growers of the northwest in attendance, the fourth annual convention of the State Horticultural society opened a three-day session in the Y. M. C. A. assembly hall this morning.

The opening session occurred at 9 o'clock this morning, when Mayor Kellogg extended welcome. C. L. Smith of Spokane made the response, which was followed by the president's annual address. Most of the forenoon session was given over to the registration of delegates and getting acquainted.

PARLIAMENT OPENED BY KING EDWARD

Third Session Since Campbell-Bannerman Ministry Was Placed in Office.

(United Press Landed Wire.) London, Jan. 29.—The third, and what promises to be the most important session of parliament since the Campbell-Bannerman ministry came into office, was opened this afternoon by King Edward with all the historic pageantry which has marked the ceremony since his accession. The sovereign himself read the speech from the throne to the assembled lords and commons in the upper chamber. King Edward and Queen Alexandra entered the house of lords and occupied their thrones, being accompanied by the prince and princess of Wales on either side of them. In the state journey to and from the chamber, the king and queen were cheered by the populace. The king and queen rode in the gilded state coach, with a brilliant escort of life guards.

There is every indication that the session will be a critical one for the party in power. Seldom in recent years have so many questions of vital importance been scheduled for consideration and action. While Irish affairs are expected to occupy the foremost place on the program, the session will be called upon to grapple with an unusually large number of other problems of great importance. The chief and most influential of these is the temperance party's imperative demand for a drastic licensing measure. The new measure, it is expected, will bring about a complete re-approaching local option. The liquor interests throughout the kingdom have already organized to fight the measure. Another item which probably will be made to amend the education act, around which such a bitter fight raged in the last session. Other important matters expected to receive attention include old-age pensions, which will go through if the different factions can agree on the details of the plan, a bill establishing a new port authority for London, with power to collect all dues and erect new docks; the re-formation of the Scottish land valuation and land bill; a measure establishing eight hours as the legal working time in all mines; and a lot of housing and other reform measures looking to the comfort and health of the poorer residents in large cities.

The budget will be not less interesting than the legislation. The proposed reforms mean a great increase in the expenditures, and when there is added to this an increase of \$15,000,000 in the usual estimates to meet the German proposal, an extra \$5,000,000 for the new army scheme and a similar increase for education, experts say the total will be \$50,000,000 more than was provided last year, and if the expansion continues there will be a further increase of \$125,000,000 next year.

RAILWAYS ASSAIL COMMISSION LAW

Contend That Washington Commission Is an Unconstitutional Tribunal.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Olympia, Wash., Jan. 29.—An effort was made yesterday by the attorneys for the Great Northern and O. R. & N. to reopen the joint wheat and potato rate cases for the introduction of further testimony. The joint rate matters are now pending in the superior court on appeal and a motion was made that the court grant further time for the taking of testimony in court. All previous evidence was submitted to the railway commission, which made findings fixing rates.

The railway commission law provides that the courts may pass upon the reasonableness and lawfulness of a rate fixed by the railway commission, which judgment shall be upon the findings and evidence as certified to the court by the commission.

HARRIMAN REFUSES TO GIVE MEN WORK

Thousand Former Employees of Southern Pacific at Oakland Are Idle.

Oakland, Jan. 29.—The policy of retrenchment on the part of the Southern Pacific company continues, until now there have been about 1,000 men thrown out of employment, at least temporarily, since December. About Christmas time, it was announced at the yards that something like 300 men had been laid off, including carmen, painters, machinists, carpenters, etc., but it was stated at the time that these were to resume work again on January 2. However, these men are still unemployed, and since then the company has continued to lay off men until at least 1,000 are out, including firemen, brakemen, engineers, switchmen, etc.

RAILROAD MAN GIVEN FOB BY WOOLGROWERS

Pendleton, Or., Jan. 29.—Because of courtesies shown to the Oregon woolgrowers on their recent excursion from Pendleton to Helena, the members of the association have presented to C. F. Van de Water, traveling freight agent on the O. R. & N., an engraved watch fob. The fob has gold pendant on which is engraved the words "Oregon Woolgrowers' association, 1908." Mr. Van de Water accompanied the party to Helena and returned and the testimony was given in appreciation of his efficient services and interest.

TEN THOUSAND FOR LOSS OF AN ARM

Supreme Court Decision Confirms Award of Lower Court in Suit Based on Mill Accident.

Salem, Or., Jan. 29.—The most important decision rendered by the supreme court this week was found in the opinion handed down in *Trickey vs. Clark*, a suit brought by the father of the boy who had his arm torn off in the Linnton sawmill. The boy was about 17 years old and a jury awarded the father \$10,000 damages for loss of limb, and the sawmill owners appealed. The court upheld the jury award. At the time of the accident the father and son were working side by side.

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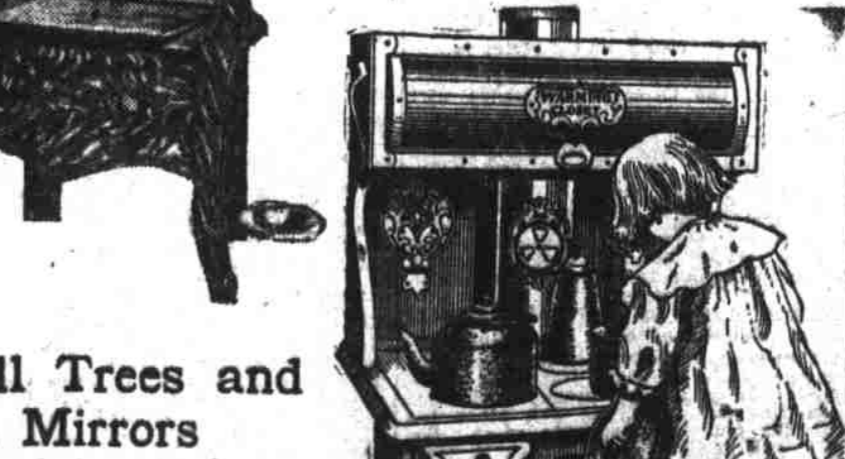
