

ROSE SHOW AUTOS TO CROSS BRIDGE

East Side Clubs Lay Plans for Reception of Carnival Parade.

A plan has been decided upon by the rose festival committee by which a part of the mammoth street parade already well advanced in preparation may be routed over the bridges to the east side. The section that has been thought advisable to send to the east side is the automobile division, one of the most spectacular features of the whole week's show. Because the automobile division will necessarily be compelled to travel much faster than the other sections it will be able to cover more ground in the same space of time and can be routed over east side streets without inconvenience to any.

Another feature in which it is thought the east side can enjoy equally with the west side is the regatta on the river. It is proposed also to hold a mardi gras during the festival—a carnival of masquerade and confetti throwing—in which the east side can take active part.

Event at Midnight.
This feature will occur at night and in order to make it impressive must be accompanied with appropriate stage setting. A number of streets must be cut off and lighted with strings of electric lights and otherwise decorated. This is the plan briefly outlined that was discussed by the United East Side club Tuesday night.

The rose carnival committee is doing everything possible to give the east side the recognition that it has never before enjoyed. It was said last night that it remains for the east side clubs to accept the proposal of the committee by doing everything in their power to make the east side features successful. Roses must be supplied, streets improved and decorated. It was also proposed that each club take an interest in the show individually and if possible erect arches over the route to be covered.

Must Improve Streets.
The big street parade will never come to the east side unless the main streets are improved. "for if it should it would never get back again." For this reason a tremendous effort to improve streets will be inaugurated. Much effort has been exerted in the past to secure the

execution of contracts left for the improvement of the principal thoroughfares on the east side, but more will be brought to bear at once.

HEYSER HOTEL WILL SWING OPEN ITS DOORS

Handsome New Hostelry on East Burnside Begins Business Saturday.

Grand opening of the Hotel Heyser, in the Proutfoot building at the east end of the Burnside bridge, will take place Saturday evening, February 1. An orchestra will furnish music from 8 to 12 o'clock and a table d'hote dinner will be served from 6 to 8:30. People of the east side have been especially invited to attend the opening and inspect the new hotel.

The hotel has been elegantly furnished and will be one of the handsomest in the city. There are 30 rooms in the building, 33 of which are furnished with separate baths. The grill is roomy and appropriately decorated and has a tile floor. The building is four stories high and a roof garden, which will be the only one in the city, will be installed next summer.

All the floors in the building are cement. The building itself is fireproof, being of reinforced concrete. The hotel will be a family hotel, conducted on the same plan as the Sargent hotel at Hawthorne and Grand avenues. Harry Edmonds is manager of the new east side hostelry.

SEVEN CLUBS ARE NOW INTERESTED PAVE EAST MORRISON WITH BELGIAN BLOCKS

Resolution Will Be Introduced in Council at Once for Improvement.

It has been proposed by the University Park board of trade that a Peninsula Federation of east side clubs be organized for the upbuilding of the peninsula. Seven clubs are interested. The University Park board of trade has already appointed a delegate to constitute the executive board of the proposed association of clubs.

Those clubs that will be eligible to representation on the executive board of the new federation include the Multnomah Improvement association, the Corin Alhina Improvement association, the Arbor Lodge Push club, the Woodlawn Push club, the Peninsula Push club, the Piedmont Push club, soon to be organized, and the University Park board of trade.

It is believed by many that more can be accomplished with such an organization and the proposal has met with general favor among the clubs on the peninsula. The peninsula is so far away from the seat of government that united action is considered more necessary than in any other portion of the city.

HURRY IMPROVEMENT ON EAST STARK STREET

Residents Now Have Promise From Chairman of Board Committee.

R. L. Sablin, chairman of the executive board committee on streets, in a recent interview with President Bigelow of the East Side Business Men's club, promised that the improvement of East Stark street between East Twelfth and East Sixteenth would be completed as quickly as possible. He asked the support of the east side business men, which was heartily granted him and he said pressure would be brought to bear upon the contractors at once.

The street has been in bad condition all winter. The property owners have become much agitated over the delay occasioned, they say, by the moods of the contractors.

Since Mr. Sablin has expressed his interest in the street the property owners are much encouraged. Stark street promises to be the central east side thoroughfare within the next three years if the improvements now under contract can be carried out within that time. As it appears now the fills below East Tenth street will be completed long before the street is improved between East Twelfth and East Sixteenth.

Resolution Will Be Introduced in Council at Once for Improvement.

Upon recommendation of City Engineer Taylor, Councilman Kellaheer is preparing a resolution to be introduced in the council asking that East Morrison street be improved at once with Belgian blocks laid on a foundation of concrete from the east end of the Morrison street bridge to the east line of Union avenue. This improvement is the same as that recently placed on Front street and is considered to be the only one that will stand the heavy travel that the streets in the warehouse district are continually subjected to.

Councilman Kellaheer said this morning that such a decision had been reached between himself and the city engineer and that the resolution had been prepared and would be introduced at the earliest convenience.

The introduction of street improvement by resolution is the quickest method and it is thought the best way with the lower Morrison street improvement, because it is the plan of the east side business men to have the street improved before the Rose Carnival so the parade can be brought to the east side without being completely destroyed on the streets.

The improvement of East Morrison between Union avenue and East Seventh has already been petitioned for and will be expedited at an early date.

Councilman Kellaheer has also been made chairman of the committee from the East Side Business Men's club appointed by President Biglow yesterday to act with the Rose Carnival committee. The other members are to be selected later.

ones, the heavy youth was the leader in the street. He was the first to catch the smaller boys by the seat of the trousers and the nape of the neck and toss them head first down the basement stairs. This was endured until one of the smaller boys suffered a broken arm. Two large boys would each take the end of a rope and run across the school grounds, upsetting the smaller boys and many times seriously injuring some of them.

Because the principals who preceded Mr. Sherwood had been lenient with the pupils of the school there grew up much dissatisfaction when Mr. Sherwood endeavored to enforce order, setting in many cases siding with the pupils. This is Sherwood's second year at the school, however, and his methods are generally approved by the people of Mount Tabor.

The three boys already named took it upon themselves to administer a rebuke to the principal. So they went to his home on a foggy night, laden with ancient and noisome eggs. Feary threw a pebble against the rear door of the principal's home which stands at 414 Spencer street and awaited developments. The principal opened the door suddenly and a flood of light revealed the Feary boy standing in the fog.
