

POTATOES TO DROP IN SOUTH BECAUSE OF VERY LIBERAL SUPPLIES—ONIONS CANNOT BE MOVED ON ACCOUNT OF COLD WEATHER

CLAY MARKETS VERY SLEGGISH

California Prices Are Sliding Down on Account of Larger Supply.

Produce market features: Potato market is lower as the larger supplies in the south and the decline in price there in consequence. Out in the country the trade is not offering over 50c and 55c for anything and there is no demand for the potatoes. California has too much of this cheap quality without shipping additional supplies from the north. The following letter from Los Angeles, received yesterday by a local buyer who ships south, explains the situation as far as southern California is concerned: "The potato market in California is in equally bad shape. I think it would be well to keep off this market for a while. Receipts for about 100,000 bushels have been fully 90 per cent larger than in any month I have known of and the writer has been in business in Los Angeles for about 20 years. The receipts for the month have been 8,000 sacks. Yesterday they were that amount and the result is that every dealer has been losing money on the potatoes shipped in here. The best Watsonville and Salinas potatoes are selling at \$1.10 and \$1.15; rivers are selling at \$1.00 and \$1.05. There is no demand for the potatoes along the coast and river to supply all demands. I look for a little demand for Oregon potatoes today at \$1.12 1/2 on track, which is less than cost."

Onion Shipments at a Standstill.

Shipments of onions are at a standstill here because of the cold weather and lack of refrigerator cars. Boxes can be had in plenty, but the trade is unwilling to take the chances of freezing while crossing the mountains to California. The trade is much more dangerous to ship onions from Oregon to California in boxcars at this time than it is to ship them in refrigerator cars. The shippers claim they can secure all the refrigerators they need in the east, and if shipments are made in the morning, the shippers claim these can be landed on the coast at \$2.10, and that they will invade the Portland market unless local people come to the aid of the situation.

Southern Market Likely to Rise.

Onion market in San Francisco and probably in Portland is expected to show advanced values during the next few days, because of the cold weather. Growers here could not move their supplies at the moment if they had the cars. All the larger growers are now shipping for \$2.10, and a few smaller ones are selling under that figure. Growers here say they have but few cars remaining and are not at all at the situation.

Butter May Go to East.

An effort is being made by a local brokerage firm to purchase several cars of extra fancy storage butter for shipment to the Chicago market. An order from there was received here yesterday afternoon. A car lot must be secured or the order cannot be filled. There is but little extra fancy butter in the local market. Fresh butter is purchased at almost any figure, a creamery which recently advanced its price to 40c for this class of butter is offering 37c for this class of butter. EGGS SELLING WELL AT REDUCED PRICES

"Eggs are coming in freely, but are selling well at the reduced prices, and I look for no changes as to prices for some days, unless very severe weather obtains. "Butter is in large supply and weak. "Poultry has been in but nominal demand and supply this week. There is a fair demand for good, large hens and large, straight springers, and small springers are quite active. Broilers and fryers are scarce and in firm request. Ducks are weaker, and geese are in rather poor demand. Live turks are dull, but fat dressed ones are quite firm and at good prices. I look for a fair demand for good goods the coming week. "Small and medium veals are still very scarce, and the trade is anxious for veal of any sort or grade. It is to be hoped that receipts will increase while demand and prices are so advantageous. "Pork has been a little scarcer and there is a firm demand at steady prices. "Potatoes are still nominal and the same is true as to hidden."—Tom Farrell of Everding & Farrell.

LOCAL WHEAT DOWN 2 CENTS

Market Breaks From Under With Foreign Weakness and Price Slump.

Local wheat values are down 2c a bushel today on account of the very sharp break at Chicago and Liverpool today and during the past few days. Club is now quoted at 82c and bluestem at 84c but this is the extreme top and it is doubtful if any great amount of wheat could be moved in the Pacific northwest at this time and these values. "Continued declines abroad in causing export agents and millers to go slow in their buying and little wheat is reported sold in the three states of the north coast during the past week. The fact that there is absolutely no demand at this time for export flour adds weakness to the general market and may force wheat still lower. However, those millers who have already purchased heavily in the opinion that prices will go back again. "The dullness in the flour market is the theme of the following from Editor Lee Peterson of the Portland Commercial Review: "Flour trade is about as dull as possible. Export and domestic trade is the same old run, as the seller and buyer are too far apart to even try to get together. Prices are held very firm, owing to the light running of the mills. While it is true that stocks are very light in the orient, it has no significance. The policy of buyers has changed in this respect. They are now taking flour from leading export mills when they feel that they must have some stock on hand to provide for a heavy and light money market. Prices for flour has considerable to do with this. Some shipments are going through on each steamer. Buying has become more of a steady trade dull. During high price periods like the present, the consumer makes his purchases as far in advance as possible, and in consequence no business is done, but at the same time many of the mills report a far better inquiry, and it is expected to be light. There has been rumors of a little shading in prices during the week, and it was impossible to trace the cause, but it is believed that the prevailing price for wheat we cannot see where any miller would profit by indulging in this practice to place flour in the market. The business accomplished shows slight increase and the loadings for coastwise trade are confined to such small lines as buyers desire in need of flour. The business is better, retailers buying with some freedom because forced to, but are not stocking up in any great extent. Flour stocks of over 100,000 bushels reported to be well depleted and this should mean new business before long.
