COLD WEATHER HOLDS BACK REGISTRATION

Registration steam has not been turned on with full force this week, the daily record being below that of previous weeks.

The cold weather keeps many of the voters hugging the stove at home, particularly those who live in the suburbs. Yesterday the total registration was a little better than the day before, reaching 273, of whom 211 were Republicans, 42 were Democrats and 20 declared allegiance to minor parties or went on record as Independents.

Including yesterday's figures the number registered is now 7,268, divided politically as follows: Republicans, 5,626; Democrats, 1,275; all others 367.
