

WOULD THE SAVIOR HAVE SIGNED "PINK CIRCULAR?"

Judge William Smith Denies Charges Made Against Him by Baker City Ministers and Denounces Them for Distributing Handbills.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Baker City, Feb. 4.—"Would Christ have signed the pink circular, denouncing the public officials of Baker City and county?" is the question asked the Ministers' association by Judge William Smith in a reply to the charges made against him in the handbill. Judge Smith denies every accusation made against him and denounces the authors of the circular in unmitigated terms, promising them that they shall hear more from him in the future and defying them to "get up in your desecrated pulpits and howl." In a signed communication addressed to the association, the circuit judge says:

"Upon my return to this city I found the beautiful mess stirred up by the holy men of God awaiting me and commending such attention as no decent man desires to give such a literary monstrosity as they had thrust upon this community."
"Baker City has always prospered because it is a town in which a proper sense of the proprieties predominates and whose citizens come as nearly doing unto others as they would have such others do unto them as can be found anywhere on earth. Heretofore they have been taught by the teachers of the law as propounded by the meek and lowly Nazarene to eschew evil and to do good, to seek peace and ensue it. And there have been fewer cases of suffering from poverty and want, perhaps, than in any other section of our country, owing largely to the fact that there is born in our people a realization of the fact that charity suffereth long and is kind, seeketh not her own, is not puffed up, and thinketh no evil. They know that she doth not behave herself unseemly. They show their appreciation of the higher life by the attention they give to our public library and the unfailing support they have also given all church organizations. The hand of want has never been refused the warm hand of Christian charity in this happy town, and all its citizens have grown together with malice towards none and charity towards all."

"I was away from home when your document filled with heavenly grace and benediction, was thrown into my backyard for their perusal and there was no one here to comfort them. May Baker City never recognize the presence of the devil again, or feel his evil influence. All the lawlessness which has cursed this community in the past, love and truth which in due time our good people will give the remedy without the aid of assassins, has never been mentioned in the name of Jesus Christ, and your cowardly and devilish scheme."
"I will see you again. You need attention and I am going to give it to you, most holy sire. And in the meantime, whenever my thoughts revert to Cotton Mather off comes my hat. You will hear from me again. Now get up in your desecrated pulpits and howl!"

PENDLETON HOUSE DAMAGED BY FIRE

TOOK BOYERTOWN GAS TANKS TO EXHIBIT

Owner Accused of Forging Name of Coroner to Profit by the Catastrophe.

Boyetown, Pa., Feb. 4.—Alleged to have forged the name of Coroner R. E. Strauser of Berks county, and to have thereby illegally obtained the two gas tanks figuring in the Boyertown theatre disaster, W. R. Gavens of Quakertown had a hearing last evening before Squire Fox of Boyertown.
W. B. Bechtel, an attorney, stated in behalf of his client that Gavens had shipped the tanks in question on January 14 to that place for advertising purposes, as he had been informed that they had been in the fire which killed 17 persons, their exhibition. He afterward grew frightened and returned the tanks to Boyertown. It is alleged the tanks were tampered with.
The express agents at Boyertown and Quakertown testified that the tanks had been shipped from Boyertown to Quakertown and back. No explanation was offered why the tanks had been removed in such a surreptitious manner. Squire Fox held the case under advisement for 10 days.

CHESTERFIELD IS NOT THE BAD MAN HE WAS

Walla Walla, Wash., Feb. 4.—Declared by an examining board to be insane, Jack Chesterfield, the Seattle convict who was ordered into custody Saturday by Governor Mead, was yesterday ordered committed to the hospital for the insane at Medical Lake by Judge Brantly. The judges feared that when the judge's decision was pronounced Chesterfield would create a rough house and four deputy sheriffs were in the courtroom at the time, prepared to handle him if he became unruly. To the surprise of the officers Chesterfield took the decision good naturedly. He is held until an officer comes from the asylum.
Chesterfield's malady is caused by a wound in the head he received at the time he attempted to blow up the Seattle jail. He was operated on by the prison physician several months ago, and since then he has shown rapid improvement. The authorities believe that eventually Chesterfield will recover.

SAVAGE WILL BE REMEMBERED

Vast Landed Estate Divided—All His Descendants Are Remembered.

Salem, Or., Feb. 4.—The last will and testament of the late John Savage, Sr., was admitted to probate in this county yesterday.
Mr. Savage was 81 years old, a pioneer of the early 40s, having served in the Indian wars of 1817-8, and had accumulated a large estate.
The will was drawn February 25, 1905, and is said to be practically the same as a former will.
The instrument after the formal parts, first provides a fund of \$10,000 for the maintenance of Mr. Savage's wife, Mrs. Ella Byrne, and each of the following children: To his daughter, Barbara Evan, 230 acres near Germain; to Mrs. Ann E. Keppinger, 220 acres near Germain; to his son, George O. Savage, the one-half of the old donation claim on the Silverton road, together with some timber land. He directs Mrs. Ella Byrne to divide the same grounds he sold within two years and the proceeds divided between his son, George O. Savage, and his two daughters, Mrs. Ella Byrne and Mrs. Ella Gleason.
None Disinherited.
A special bequest of \$1,000 is made to Mrs. Rebecca Savage and a like amount to Mrs. Anna Keppinger, while \$4,000 is given to his daughter, Mrs. Gleason, and the sum of \$6,000 to his daughter, Mrs. Ella Byrne. George O. Savage is given the gold watch and chain so highly prized by the decedent, and together with Mrs. Ella Byrne and Mrs. Gleason, the three children to inherit the balance of his estate. Mr. Savage did not disinherit any of his children or grandchildren, and his estate has been commonly rumored, and in addition to the provisions of the will, his grandchildren, children of his daughter, Mrs. Gleason, Mrs. Martin, will receive jointly one-sixth of the estate. George O. Savage is named executor without bonds, and is also named as trustee of the widow's share of the estate. The will covers four pages of typewriting, and on account of practically all the farms included in the children's share, the will is deemed to them prior to his death, the amount of his estate at the time of his death is estimated at only \$55,000.

Countess Emerich Szechenyi, nee Alexandra, Countess Szebeny-Szinyi, Imperial and Royal Dame of the Palace, Dame of the Star and Cross Order, Widow of the late Count Emerich Szechenyi of Sarvas, Feldegg, Imperial and Royal Chamberlain, Royal Hungarian Cup Bearer, Knight of the Order of the Golden Fleece, Grand Cross of the Order of St. Stephen Grand Cross of the Order of St. Leon, and of the Order of the Holy Spirit, Some time Ambassador at the Imperial German Court.
Has the honor to announce the contemplated marriage of her son, Count Laszlo Szechenyi, Imperial and Royal Chamberlain, Hereditary member of the Hungarian House of Magnates, Lieutenant of Reserves in the Ninth Hussars Count Nadassy with Fraulein Gladys Vanderbilt, Daughter of the late Herr Cornelius Vanderbilt, of New York, and nee Alice Gwynne.

WASHINGTON'S RULES FOR THE RAILROADS

Ten in Number, Now Effective, and Relating to Fares and Percent Treatment.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Olympia, Wash., Feb. 4.—The rules and regulations issued by railroad commission, which became effective February 1 are 10 in number.
Rule 1 provides that holders of regular trip tickets shall be entitled to continuous transportation between the points named within one day after the date of sale, and that cash fares collected on the train shall not exceed the maximum rates provided by law. This rule changes the custom of the railroads in declaring tickets good only on the day of sale and of collecting a premium on cash fares.
Rule 2 provides that unused tickets shall be redeemable by the railway company within 60 days after date of sale.
Rule 3 provides for the issuance of interchangeable mileage tickets for 2,000 miles at not to exceed \$50, and provides that the amount of mileage detached, calculated at 3 cents per mile, shall not exceed the cash fare regularly charged.
Rule 4 lays down sanitary regulations for waiting-rooms and cars and their lavatories.
