ONE FOR LUMBER; OTHER FOR WHEAT

Two Large Tramp Steamers Join Foreign Fleet in the Harbor.

CARGO SHIP FROM EUROPE IN RIVER

Arctic Stream From Rotterdam Reached River With Southerly Breeze and Bark and Barkentine Follow.

After a record breaking run from San Pedro the British steamer Gryfevale arrived in the harbor at noon today in ballast under charter to Balfour, Guthrie & Co. to carry wheat to Hongkong. She dropped anchor in the stream to wait for a berth at one of the grain docks.

ago, and this will be the largest cargo of wheat to go to Hongkong for a long time. The British steamer Mortlake which reached Astoria Sunday night, a week late to save her charter, was rechartered yesterday by the American Trading company and she is now on the way up the river bound for the Portland Lumber company's mill in South Portland to load lumber for the Orient. She will carry about 3,000,000 feet.

The British ship Arctic Stream reached Astoria this morning from Rotterdam with a general cargo consigned to Meyer, Wilson & Co. She made a slow trip, having been out since September. A three-masted bark and barkentine also crossed in over the bar during the day. Up till a late hour their identity could not be established. The barkentine is believed to be the Echo from Callao. The bark is possibly the overdue Emily Reed with coal from Newcastle, Australia. She was quoted at 15 per cent reinsurance yesterday when 90 days out.

REMEMBERS YEAR WELL.

Captain Cafferata of the St. Egbert Was Here 16 Years Ago. Captain O. E. Cafferata, master of the British steamer St. Egbert, this morning came up from St. Johns where his vessel is loading lumber for Manila to file his papers and attend to other business in connection with the vessel's visit. It is 16 years since Captain Cafferata was in Portland last and he was pleasantly surprised at the growth of the city. Portland since leaving here 16 years ago as master of the British ship Iron Craig, said Captain Cafferata this morning. "Because at the end of that voyage I resigned command and the next departure of the Iron Craig was the last. She went down with all hands on the way from Europe. It was just my luck to escape. The St. Egbert came here from Guaymas, Mexico, and speaking of the voyage up the coast, Captain Cafferata said it was featureless excepting that he had never before seen such hungry sea gulls. He declares they would come down and steal food from the cook and mess boys if the doors to the galley or messrooms were left open. The St. Egbert will load a full cargo of lumber at the mills of the St. Johns Lumber company for Iloilo and Manila. She will take away about 3,000,000 feet. The St. Egbert belongs to the same line as the St. Hugo which will leave here tomorrow for Europe with a cargo of wheat.

SAILED WITH OFFICERS.

Captains of Steamers St. Egbert and St. Hugo Mourn St. Cutberrit Loss. The British steamer St. Cutberrit which was burned and lost off the coast of Nova Scotia last Saturday, belongs to the same fleet as the St. Egbert and St. Hugo now in this harbor. Captain Cafferata of the St. Egbert and Captain Clements of the St. Hugo are well acquainted with the officers of the ill-fated craft. Fifteen of the crew were drowned and a number lost their lives in the flames and Captain Cafferata and Clements are much downcast over the news. Chief Officer Dickerson of the St. Cutberrit was sailing under Captain Clements up till a couple of years ago when he joined the new steamer. Chief English near Patterson sailed under Captain Cafferata for several years. It is not known if these officers were among the lost. The St. Cutberrit was a trifle larger craft than either of the two in this harbor at present. She had been engaged mostly in the cattle trade on the Atlantic.
