His policies aggregate \$4,000,000. His father, John Wanamaker, is insured for \$1,500,000. The policies of President Roosevelt aggregate \$35,000. TWO EUGENE BANKS TO CONSOLIDATE. Eugene, Or., Feb. 5.—The First National bank and the Chambers-Bristow bank of this city have consolidated, and in a few days the effects of the latter will be transferred to the quarters of the National bank. President F. L. Chambers will retire from the banking business altogether, but Cashier Bristow will accept a position with the National. The capital stock of the bank under the new combination will be increased from \$100,000 to \$200,000, and the quarters will be enlarged, and will use the entire lower floor of both buildings. The matter was brought up before the financial stringency came on, but was by that untoward event delayed. The members of the council are unanimous for paved streets. The work, if undertaken, will in all probability be done by local people, as all the necessary material is at hand. Roseburg has had the most substantial building period in the past two or three years of any town of its size in southern Oregon.
