## SPORTSMEN TALK OVER GAME LAWS

### Association Will Meet in April to Prepare Changes for the Legislature.

Defects in the Oregon game laws and the necessity of remedying them, together with the election of officers, occupied the attention of the Oregon Fish and Game association at its annual meeting held in the rooms of the Chamber of Commerce last night. The meeting was largely attended, a greater number of local sportsmen being present than at any former meeting of the association.

Among the important phases of the same situation that engaged the attention of the association was the proposition of wild fowl on the breeding grounds in the western lake districts and in other sections of the state, and the proposed amendment of the game law allowing duck shooting during the open season of February.

The legislative committee was instructed to investigate the reported killing of the eggs of wild fowls by Indians and others and take the proper steps to protect the birds on their breeding grounds. This committee will also look into the matter of extending the duck shooting season to March 1.

A number of minor matters were discussed, including a bounty on crows, an amendment of the trout laws and the question of making the closed season for deer apply to the whole state.

All that now remains is for Scholtes to name the exact date and post his forfeit, which will be covered by Smith and the match is made.

"I would go up to the Dalles and have a talk with Scholtes," said the stranger this morning. "But Kennedy prevents me. All that Mr. Scholtes has to do is to communicate his terms to me and if they are reasonable I shall give him his answer immediately. Of course I can't arrange for any match until after I have done with Kennedy."

By the way, I don't anticipate much trouble with this man Kennedy when we meet Friday night. He is a big fellow but I feel sure that I can prevent him from throwing me in 15 minutes, and if I can do that the game is mine. I know what he can do and I know that he can't last more than 15 minutes.

## CRACK SKATERS AT OAKS RINK COVER 196 1-2 LAPS IN AN HOUR.

One of the most interesting roller-skating races ever seen on the Pacific coast was held at the Oaks rink last night when nine contestants sped around the track at breakneck speed taking the corners in a manner thrilling the spectators. Six of the racers finished with 97 1/2 laps to their credit, while the others were close behind.

There were but few falls and those toward the end of the race. In this way Scholtes lost a lap and a quarter and Little lost one lap. Harrison was taken sick early in the race but after losing two laps stuck gamely to the race and held his own until the finish, losing one-half lap on the spur.

Although the race was not so fast as on Monday night when the high score was 99 laps, it was just as interesting. The men showed the benefit of their first night's experience and kept free from the exciting and dangerous spills around the corners. An occasional spurt showed the beauty of the sport as one man would leap out from the string of skaters and shoot in the lead.

Erwin was the most successful in this game although he lacked the strength to hold his lead. Three times he jumped out on the racers from fourth or fifth place and took the lead in beautiful manner. His last attempt fell a trifle short and he crowded Holt to the wall throwing the leader to fifth or sixth position where he remained until the final spurt.

Card clearly showed the form last night. His quick, heady work in taking a position and his general racing skill made him a favorite with a large portion of the crowd. Holt while seeming to possess more endurance than Card did not perform so well last night as on Monday. Copeland is a large, strong youth who will give the others a run for the money before the contest is over. He is a strong, great fighter and is picked by a large following to win the race. Brent has dropped out of the contest and Schwartz has taken his place with Brent's score of 94 made Monday night.

About 600 people watched the races last night and cheered the men wildly as they spurted around the track. At the finish a perfect bedlam of yells and cheers went up as the men made their final dash for the goal. The total score for Monday and Tuesday follows:

The laborer was passing a clump of bushes when the wild man jumped out and grabbed the man by the neck. The laborer turned and jerked hard on the handle, spilling a portion of his lunch. At the same time he made a movement towards the pocket as if reaching for a gun. The wild man snatched a piece of bread from the ground and darted away through the brush.

Since Friday the wild man has been camping in a deserted shack in the woods near the schoolhouse. At times he is seen by children, he is said to be perfectly rational. At other times he dashes madly through the brush, or stands with his feet spread apart and beats his bare chest. He spent Sunday carrying pieces of bark and chips from various parts of the woods to the shack.
