

WHOSE CALL IN MID-PACIFIC British Steamer Gryfevale Battles With Hurricanes for Three Days. MEN TOSSED ABOUT AND BADLY BRUISED

Liberal Use of Oil Saves Craft From Going Down Before Howling Wind and Mountain-High Seas—Here to Load Wheat for Orient.

When coming out to this coast from Japan the British steamer Gryfevale so narrowly escaped foundering that even the experienced and daring officers and engineers were on the verge of joining the Chinese crew in giving up hope of living through it. To ride out two terrific hurricanes, lasting three days, was the experience of the craft that arrived here yesterday afternoon from Japan via San Pedro.

It is admitted that but for the abundant use of oil the big freighter would have fallen prey to the hungry combers that roiled clean over the bridge and at times sent spray over the tall stack. Two life-boats were smashed and carried away, the bridge rail was twisted like so much wire and the cabin doors were torn from their fastenings and smashed into kindling, although built of solid oak. The iron stanchions and the remaining portions of the bridge were bent by the sheer force of the seas. To look at it one would never believe that the force of the waves could be capable of giving such damage, but the log book bears out the statements of the officers.

Swept Across Deck. Chief Officer Blair was carried half way across the vessel by a wave that threw the steward from one end of the cabin to the other. It filled the officers' apartments to a depth of three feet and out port windows of the fire-place tilting in the cabin. The Chinese sailors were shuffled about like cards in a deck, but fortunately managed to cling to the stanchions and lines, thus saving themselves from being swept away to certain death.

Encounters Second Hurricane.

At last the wind began to ease up a bit and the crew decided to get under way. The wheel had hardly begun churning the water before another hurricane sprang up, the howling wind carrying before it great sheets of hail. It was the worst anyone on board had ever seen or heard of, and it again became necessary to heave to for another 24 hours the big tramp rolled about helplessly and the danger of going down was even greater than during the first blow. During the night a tremendous wave hit the craft so hard that she trembled from stem to stern and several of the crew made for the life preservers and the remaining life-boats. But the craft stood the test, and the men returned to their posts.

The Gryfevale is at the Eastern & Western Lumber company's wharf to receive a cargo of wheat for Hongkong. She was built two years ago in Port Glasgow, and is in command of Captain John Steel, assisted by First Officer Blair, Second Officer Allan and Third Officer West.

ALONG THE WATERFRONT

The German bark Reinbek cleared this morning for Queenstown or Pal-mouth for orders with 153,821 bushels of wheat, valued at \$164,672. She is expected to leave down this afternoon. The oil steamer Atlas arrived at the Portsmouth tanks last night with 17,000 barrels of oil from California.

The British bark Alexander Black, which arrived at Astoria yesterday in ballast, from San Diego, comes under charter to the Northwestern Warehouse company to carry a cargo of wheat from this port to Europe.

The British steamer Mortlake, Captain Hattin, is at the mills of the Portland Lumber company in South Portland, loading lumber for Port Adelaide, Australia. She arrived last night, 10 days out from Guaymas, Mexico. Captain Hattin reports a pleasant voyage from the Mexican port.

The British ship Arctic Stream reports losing a man on the voyage here from Rotterdam. L. Bengelink, sailor, leaped overboard from the forecastle head one day after having recovered from a prolonged drunk. The captain, however, refused to take advantage of the offered assistance.

TWO NEW STATIONS.

Weather Bureau Branches at Coos Bay and in Siskiyou Mountains. Willis S. Moore, chief of the weather bureau, today authorized District Forecaster E. A. Beals of the local office to establish two branch offices, one at Marshfield and the other in the Siskiyou mountains, this station. Forecaster Beals suggested the establishment of these stations recently and was pleased this morning to secure the chief's favorable reply.

The stations will be of great value to this district because through the Marshfield office it will be possible to receive advance notice of storms approaching from the southern Oregon coast, while the Siskiyou mountains station will furnish reports of particular value to shippers of produce. It is of great importance to the shippers to know what sort of weather conditions prevail in the mountains because upon it depends whether or not the produce needs to be shipped in refrigerator cars. The only trouble with this station is the difficulty in keeping the wires intact at all times.

Chief Moore of the weather bureau is doing much to perfect the service and it is being much appreciated, judging from the public's faith in the reports and forecasts of the local office. Not long ago a station was established at Blaine, Washington. It furnishes reports on weather conditions in the most northerly portions of Puget sound.

REDUCES DUTY ON WINE.

United States Enters Into Reciprocity With France. Champagne and other sparkling wines imported from France will be admitted into the country at reduced rate according to advances received by the local collector of customs today. The reduction amounts to \$2 a case. The official circular announces that the United States government has entered into reciprocity with that of France, with the result that the duty on champagne and other high-class wines has been reduced from \$8 to \$6 per case. The reduction went into effect on the first of this month.

P. & L. MILL IN HANDS OF HILL

Gives North Bank Additional Slice of Waterfront—History of Plant.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Vancouver, Wash., Feb. 5.—While the officials of the Pittock & Leadbetter Lumber company have nothing to say on the subject, it is generally accepted that the mill of the company has passed into the hands of the Hill railway interests. The Hill people now own practically all of the Vancouver waterfront from a point a short distance west of the Vancouver ferry slip to the Portland Seattle railway bridge. It is rumored that the mill is to be dismantled and the site on which it stands used for other purposes. Of late the mill has been cutting little lumber, its main business being the turning out of lumber for station buildings to be erected along the lines of the Portland & Seattle.

MANY FRIENDS PAY TRIBUTE TO DEAD

Large Attendance at Funeral Services of Late Frank Hachoney.

The funeral of Frank Hachoney was held from Holman's chapel this afternoon at 1 o'clock, interment being in Riverview cemetery. Despite the inclement weather a large number of citizens who knew Mr. Hachoney during his long residence in this city did him a last honor by following the remains to the cemetery. Judge E. C. Bronaugh, R. C. Prince, George A. Luke, William Bodman and J. Welsh were the pallbearers. These men were associated with Mr. Hachoney during the founding and early work of the Fourth Presbyterian church. Rev. John R. Welch, pastor of the Fourth Presbyterian church, officiated. Judge E. C. Bronaugh, who had known Mr. Hachoney for the last 28 years and had been closely associated with him, spoke briefly of his life, of his character and what he had done for Portland; of his long and successful career as a public officer both in the service of the city and the county; and of his private life.
