

# WITNESS TO ROBBERY

## Two of Trio Who Held Up Postmaster at Hillsdale Confess and Tell Where Third Conspirator Is to Be Found.

By the capture and confession of two youths, who are now behind the bars in the county jail, Sheriff Stevens and Deputy Sheriff Bulger have cleared up the facts surrounding the robbery of the postoffice and store at Hillsdale last Monday night. The confessions of the young men implicate a third youth, who will probably be arrested in Woodburn by the United States authorities before the day is over, and show that the trio arranged a clever scheme in which one of their number pretended that he had been held up by the others.

Last Monday night a young man who later proved to be Earl Hanke entered the store and asked Postmaster Mercer, who is also the storekeeper, to sell him some tobacco. While Mercer's back was turned two other men entered the store and one covered the postmaster and the supposed customer with a revolver, while the other went through the money drawer and through the pockets of the postmaster. The man who made the search went into the postoffice department but did not find the cash till he asked the man with the gun about taking the stamps, and the latter told him to leave them alone, as they were "only looking for 'fule's money."

**Robbers Do Not Disturb.**

Although Hanke held up his hands and pretended to be frightened, Mercer noticed that the robbers did not search him. Hanke left at Laurwood and when he returned home that night he told his brother that he had been held up about one mile from the store and that he had been taken to a place where the next morning he went out and found his hat.

The sheriff and Deputy Bulger arrested Hanke at his home yesterday and held him on suspicion. Last evening he confessed that he, "Del" Haywood and Earl West had planned the robbery, he playing the part of pretended customer. He said that West was the man who handled the gun. He stated that they obtained about \$30, and when they divided the spoils he received \$20. He spent \$5 and the other \$15 was found at his home, where he had concealed it.

**West Also Confesses.**

West was arrested early this morning at First and Madison streets, and after learning of the confession of his partner he acknowledged his part in the affair. He said that he obtained \$20 and that Haywood, who has not yet been arrested, got the remainder, except the \$20 given to Hanke. He had spent practically all of the money, having celebrated the affair around the saloons.

West and Haywood are said to have been in the reform school in their younger days, but Hanke has never been in trouble before. West's home is in the country in the direction of Beaverton, and Haywood lives in South Portland.

Although no money was taken from the postoffice funds, the ransacking of the postoffice brings the offense under the United States laws, and the young men will be dealt with in the federal court. A deputy marshal has gone to Woodburn to arrest Haywood.

The Hillsdale robbery in many respects resembles the affair for which four other youths are in jail awaiting the action of the federal court, they having robbed a drug store and branch postoffice on Jefferson street a few months ago.

## MADE BOAST OF 500 HOLD-UPS

### William Harvey Swelled Up Once Too Often and Lands in Jail.

A man who boasts of having committed at least 500 successful holdups, who is wanted in Seattle to answer to a charge of highway robbery, and who is an escaped convict from the penitentiary at Walla Walla, with a record of \$75 for his capture bringing over him, was arrested in this city last night by Detectives Coleman and Price and is now a prisoner in the city jail.

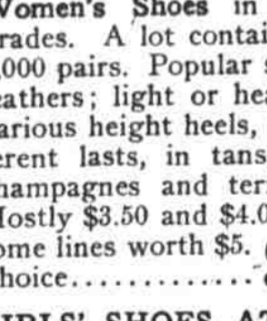

## PENDLETON MAY HAVE A MUNICIPAL PLANT

### Eastern Oregon City Plans to Furnish Own Light and Power.

 Pendleton, Feb. 6.—At the meeting of the city council held last night an important step toward municipal ownership of an electric light and power plant was taken, when Councilman C. P. Strain introduced the subject of generating electricity in a monster plant near the city. At the present time the city is supplied with electricity from the Northwestern Gas & Electric company's plant near Milton and as the contract for city lighting was discussed the matter of securing an independent supply of electricity was brought up.

A communication from the mayor of Milton was read offering to furnish Pendleton with 1,000-horsepower electric current for \$25 per annum, per horsepower, from Milton's municipal plant. This is but a small fraction of the present cost of electricity to the city of Pendleton.

**Lawn Tennis Association.** (United Press Lined Wire.)  
 New York, Feb. 6.—Prominent devotees of tennis are journeying to New York from various parts of the country to attend an important meeting of the National Lawn Tennis association to be held here tomorrow. Questions of disputed jurisdiction are to be settled, and the proposal to take the national championship tourney away from Newport will be discussed and acted upon. Another matter of importance to receive attention is a proposed change in the by-laws of the association which shall require champions to play through tourneys instead of simply defending their titles in one final round with the tourney winners, as has been the custom heretofore.

## MILKMAN TURNED AND MILK, TOO, PROBABLY

### Accosted by Footpad, Deliveryman Batters Down Door of Residence.

While Leo Roberts, a young milkman, was delivering milk at the house of A. Hadenburger, 306 East Eighth street, just before 6 o'clock this morning, he was accosted by a lone highwayman, who commanded him to hold up his hands on penalty of instant death. Roberts was so frightened that he turned and ran to the house, proke in the front door, which was locked, and did not stop until he found himself in the kitchen at the rear of the house.

Mr. Hadenburger was awakened by the disturbance, and when he learned its cause he at once notified the police over the telephone of what had occurred. In the meantime the highwayman had made himself scarce and has not since been seen.
