Burglars Enter Restaurant to Get Contents of Salvation Army Box.

A series of thefts varying in degree from burglary to the passing of a bogus bill were reported to the police last night and this morning. In all of the cases the men responsible for the incursions of the law got well away with the proceeds of their raids and are now being searched for by detectives.

Burglars entered the restaurant at 53 Third street some time during the night by climbing over the transom of the street door. The Salvation Army box was robbed of its contents, this being the only thing of value found about the place. The burglars then entered an entrance to the room next door and appropriated two boxes of cigars and several bottles of whisky.

A sneak thief entered the apartments of Miss M. J. Crandall at the Bushmark hotel Wednesday night and stole a silver link purse and a pair of gold and pearl mounted opera glasses. He departed without leaving his address and the police are now seeking to remedy this oversight.

A well-dressed individual secured \$50 good money as change out of a bogus bank bill which he presented yesterday to Mrs. Tureen, who conducts a lodging-house at 42 North Fifth street. The police have been asked to apprehend the man.

On Wednesday night a thief forced an entrance to the yard of the Liberty Coal & Ice company, at Thirteenth and Pettygrove streets, and stole 500 grain sacks. The sacks were carried away in an express wagon. Yesterday the sacks were located in the possession of a second-hand dealer, who declares he purchased them in good faith from a man whose name is unknown to him. The police are still prosecuting a search for the man who took the sacks from the coal yard.

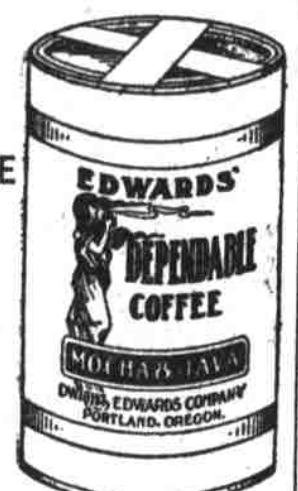
