### JURY SELECTED THEN HE PLEADS GUILTY

After 11 jurors had been secured to try him yesterday afternoon, J. F. Hawkes pleaded guilty to the charge of horse stealing before Judge Gantenbein in the circuit court. He was given an indeterminate sentence of from one to ten years in the state penitentiary.

Hawkes' attorney made a plea for leniency, urging the fact that he is 65 years of age, and may not have many years to live. Deputy District Attorney Haney urged that the sentence should be sufficient to convey a warning to other thieves and stated that Hawkes has property worth \$60,000, showing that he could not plead poverty as an excuse for stealing.

Hawkes broke down and wept as his attorney pleaded for a light sentence. The charges on which he was convicted was that of stealing a valuable horse from A. F. Johnson, a Gresham farmer, but several similar charges could have been brought against him.

### ICE PLANT TO BEGIN OPERATING APRIL 1

Active Construction Under Way on Buildings in St. Johns.

The Harris Ice Machine company of 174 East Water street, which purchased a three-acre site in St. Johns several weeks ago for manufacturing purposes, has commenced active building operations and promises to be producing ice by April 1. A spur from the main electric line direct to the plant will be constructed, thus affording economical shipping facilities.

The company will not use the electric power of the Portland Railway, Light and Power company, but will install a 1-horse power engine which has been purchased in St. Louis, and make their own power. As soon as the O. R. & N. completes its line, the Harris concern intends to transfer their entire plant to St. Johns.
