LOCOMOTIVE AT ECHO EXPLODES

Brakeman Hough Perhaps Fatally Scalded—Engine-men Are Little Injured.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Pendleton, Or., Feb. 7.—While switching in the yards at Echo this morning the crown sheet of an O. R. & N. freight engine produced an explosion, seriously if not fatally scalding brakeman James E. Hough, who was standing on the tender. Engineer Howells and Fireman Long escaped with but slight bruises. The cab was utterly demolished. The injured brakeman was brought to the hospital here on a light engine sent down from Pendleton with a relief train.

TRIES TO SELL LOOT TO OWNERS

Thief Offers Stolen Property to Men He Robbed in Railway Camp.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Vancouver, Wash., Feb. 7.—Gustave Klinter, a railway laborer, is under arrest here charged with stealing various articles from a construction camp near Ridgefield. A pleading guilty Klinter said he needed the money and that he would not work for \$1.40 a day. The circumstances of the theft and the capture were most peculiar. Klinter entered the railway camp while the workmen, who are Greeks, were away. He took two pairs of boots, four razors and several other articles. Starting down the railway right of way he met a number of men and not knowing that they were the men to whom the stolen articles belonged, endeavored to sell them their own property. The Greeks grabbed Klinter and binding him, took him to Ridgefield. He was at first left in charge of E. A. Blackmore, but yesterday morning was placed under guard of four young men who let him get away. Walking seemed to be Klinter's forte and although Sheriff Sappington arrived shortly after he had made his get away, Klinter was half way to Kalama when overtaken. The prisoner does not attempt to deny that he is guilty and beyond saying he needed money and would not work for such small wages as \$1.40 per day, is silent.

LISTON CLEARED BY FEDERAL INSPECTOR

(United Press Leased Wire.) Tacoma, Feb. 7.—C. L. Davis, supervisor in the government Indian service completed his investigation of the affairs of former Superintendent of Indian Agencies Harry F. Liston yesterday, and failed to find an instance where suspicion could attach to shortage, or where a single penny had been wrongfully used of the funds to his credit which amounted to several thousand dollars. Mr. Liston was granted leave of absence January 6, upon which date he departed for Sullivan, Indiana, the home of his father, but left there the morning following his arrival without partaking of breakfast or signifying where he was going. Since then nothing has been heard from him. Wife and friends of the missing superintendent fear that mental derangement is sufficient cause for the belief that Liston has destroyed himself, or is wandering around the country, little knowing himself of what he is doing.
