ROAD BUILDERS OF LINN IN CONVENTION

 Albany, Or., Feb. 7.—At their annual convention, held here yesterday, the Linn county road supervisors reported on the past year's operations and discussed plans for the future. The policy of the county court was unanimously indorsed, especially in respect of its building bridges by direct application of county funds through the supervisors

with the forces placed under them by law, instead of advertising for bids and letting contracts. It was the testimony of the supervisors that the policy pursued secures better bridges for less money.

The care of machinery, the proper method of shortening bridges, voluntary work, the pay of supervisors and men, the district fund, guide posts, law points, Missouri drags, fences and encroachments on the county roads received attention. Perfect grading and drainage were emphasized as the most important of all points in roadbuilding.

Oaks Rink Tonight.

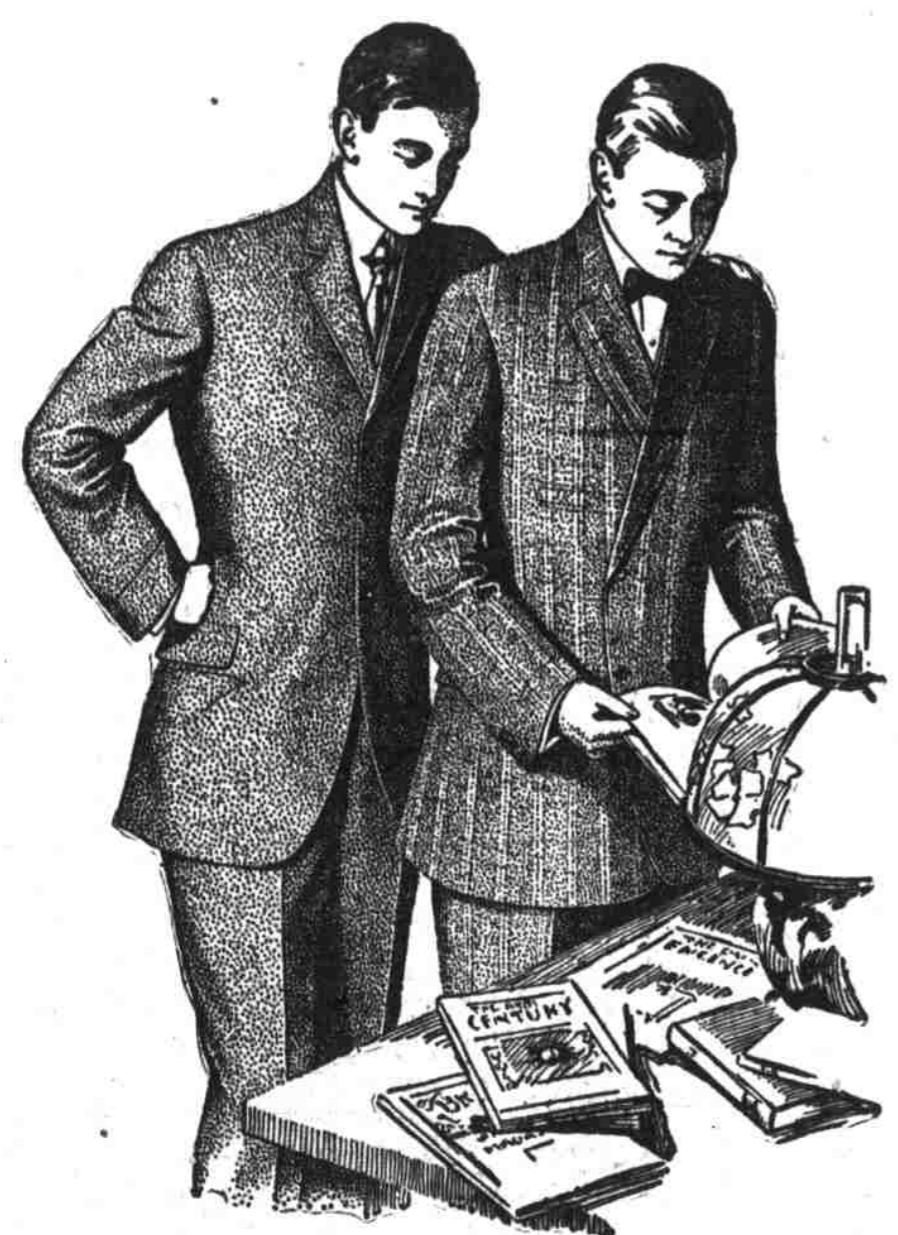

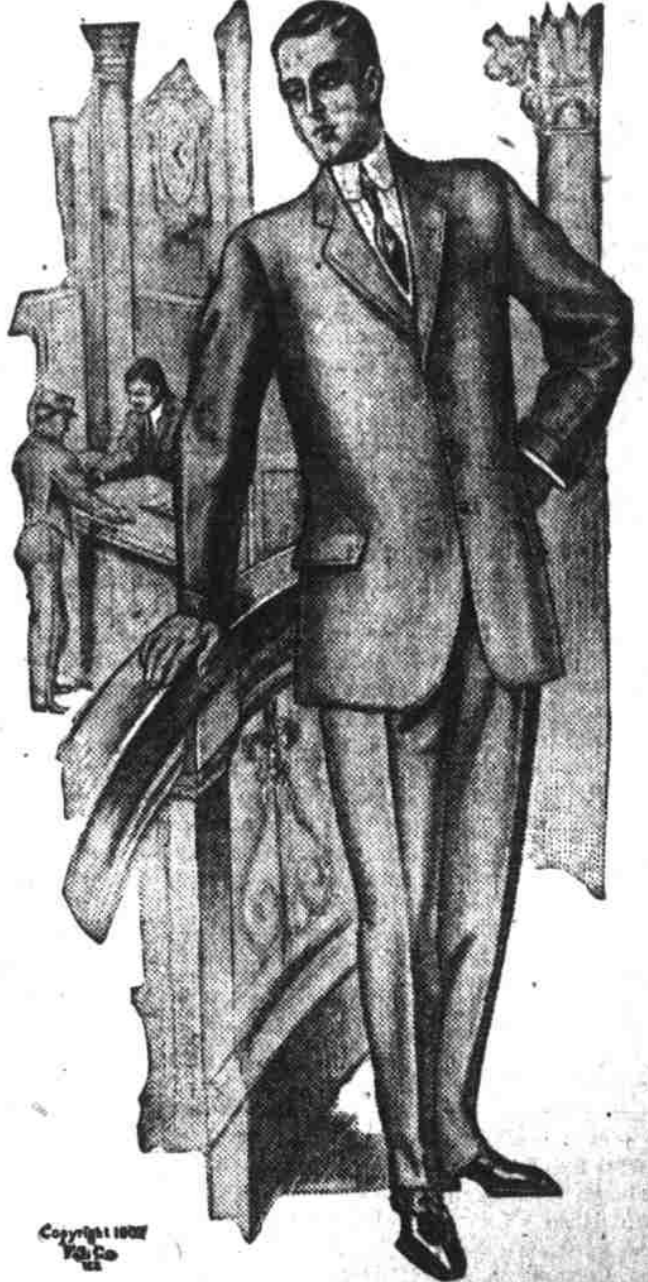
