

NEARLY MOBBED BY CHINK TARS "Strangler" Smith Has Narrow Escape on Steamer Bessie Dollar.

WRESTLER SAVES LIFE OF COOLIE Hauling Him on Board of Vessel by Queue Arouses Anger of Shipmates and Fierce Riot is Barely Avoided on Vessel in Stream.

"Strangler" Smith, longshoreman and wrestler, had a narrow escape from being mobbed yesterday afternoon by Chinese sailors of the British steamer Bessie Dollar. He aroused their anger when saving one of their number from death by using his queue for a rope.

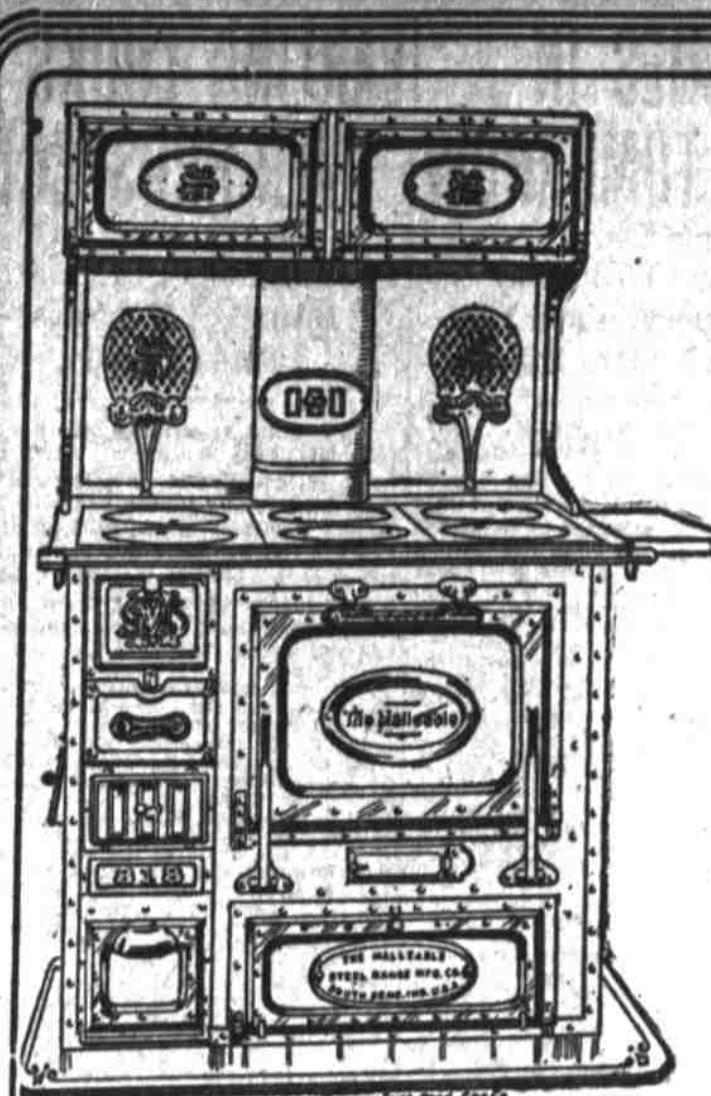
