

MADE FASTEST RIN OF SEASON

French Bark Emilie Galline Arrives From London Direct.

TAR FALLS FROM YARD BUT LIVES

Captain Arnaudtson Prides Himself on Having Most Sanctimonious Crew Judging From Names of Men in Forecastle—Brings Cement

The French bark Emilie Galline, Captain Ludwig Arnaudtson, arrived in the harbor this morning with a cargo of cement from London. She made the fastest run of the season from Europe, covering the distance by way of Cape Horn in 124 days from port to port. She was 15 days off the mouth of the river, so her actual sailing time was only 114 days.

A young sailor named Le Pape had a miraculous escape from death when the vessel was rounding Cape Horn. While assisting in hauling the canvas he lost hold on the main topgallant yard and plunged head first through the mass of rigging. His shipmates expected to see him dashed to pieces on the deck, but the plucky tar managed to grab a line, which stopped his downward flight. The sudden jump nearly tore and arms from their sockets, but the pain soon disappeared. Captain Arnaudtson says it was a most remarkable escape from death. It is said he dropped fully a distance of 75 feet.

In speaking of his crew, Captain Arnaudtson says he has a sanctimonious crew. One is named Le Pape (the pope), another Le Veque (the bishop), a third Labbe (priest) and a fourth Cure (curate).

"Did anyone ever hear the like?" asks the skipper. "Certainly I have a sanctimonious crew, judging from their names."

The Emilie Galline encountered both storms and fine weather, but taken all around had a pleasant voyage. Coming up the Pacific in the wearisome latitude of the equator the crew had to make things interesting by hooking immense men eating sharks. A string of 13 was the record catch one day. Some sharks measured 5 feet in length.

The Emilie Galline was here about a year ago. She is consigned to Meyer, Wilson & Co. and will probably be discharging at Columbia dock tomorrow.

NICEMEDIA DEPARTS.

The Portland & Asiatic liner Nicomedia, Captain Wagemann, left down this afternoon bound for Hongkong and way ports with a cargo of lumber, flour and general merchandise valued at \$85,591.

Flour shipments are light as usual at this time of the year, there being but 15,846 barrels on the steamer, as compared with 45,000 barrels at other times. She carries more lumber than ordinarily, however, there being 553,715 feet in the hold.

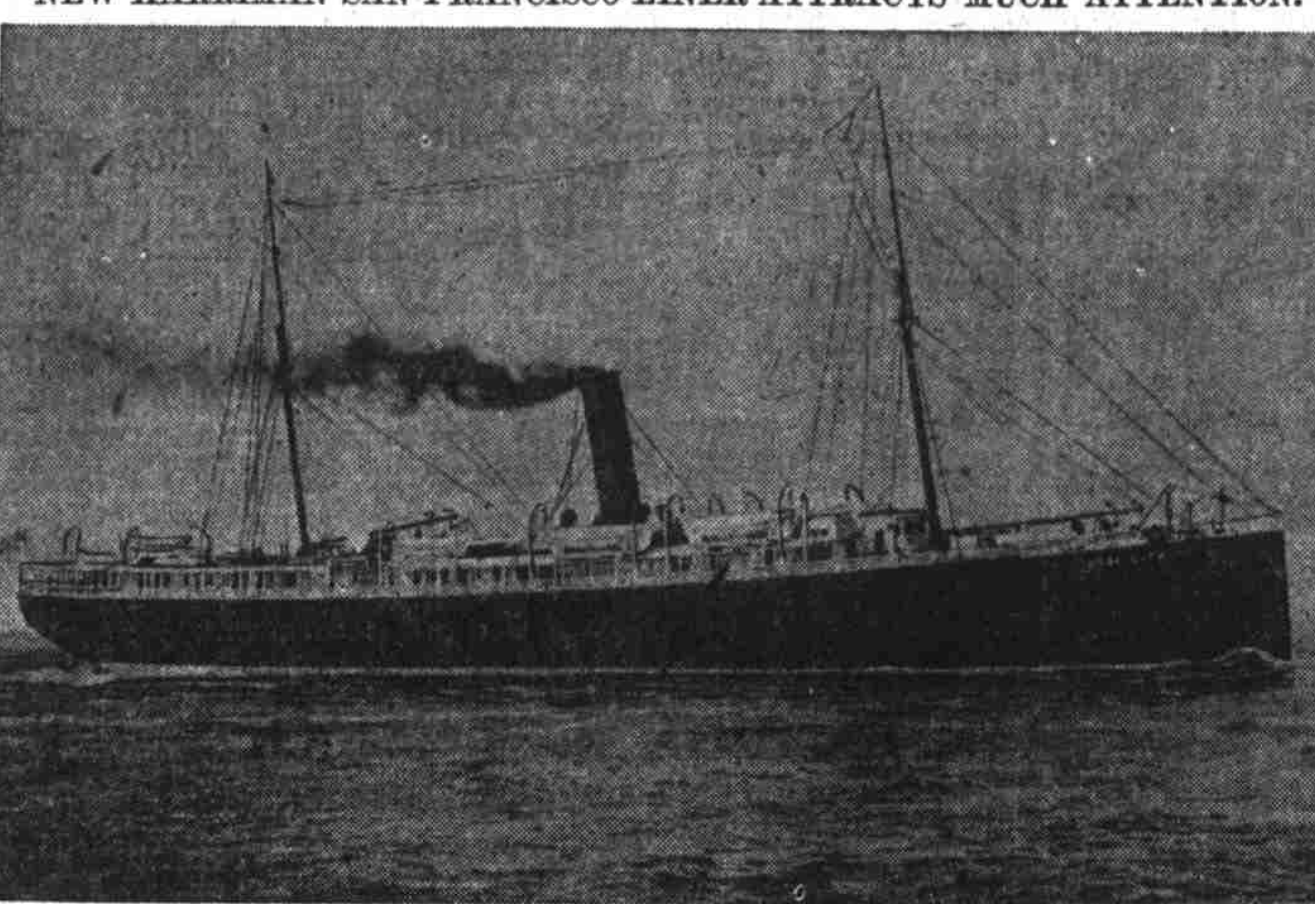
