Women Pull Hair and Fight Police in Effort to Enter English Legislative Hall—Go to Prison to Become Martyrs in Eyes of Followers.

(United Press Leased Wire.) London, Feb. 11.—While the house of commons was in session today a band of suffragists who were denied admittance stormed the building and it was only after a fierce struggle that they could be beaten back by the police. Forty-four of the women were arrested during the melee. Shortly after the house convened the advocates of equal suffrage appeared. They demanded admission but were informed that the doors were closed to them. After securing reinforcements, numbering several hundreds, the women stormed the doorkeepers and the police were called. Ruffling hair and weeping copiously the women dashed into the fray. The police attempted to handle them gently, but they refused to be overcome by this method. Then clubs were produced and a number of fair heads cracked by the "bobbers."

RATE CASE RIGHT IN THE FAMILY

Mileage Rule Violated in the Commissioner's Own Book—Another Defi.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Olympia, Feb. 11.—Railroad Commissioner J. C. Lawrence has lost out in trying to secure the observance by the Northern Pacific of rule 3 of the new regulations issued by the commission. In violation of the order the conductor on the Seattle-Olympia train deducted 73 mileage coupons from Mr. Lawrence's own book when, according to this rule, only 60 should have been deducted. The rule requires that the mileage drawn shall not exceed numerically one third of the regular cash fare, expressed in cents. The fare between Seattle and Olympia is \$1.80, and is a low rate promulgated to meet boat competition. Mr. Lawrence demanded and received a receipt for the extra mileage coupons. The requirement of the commission that the list of 11 rules shall be posted in every railway station being complied with by the Northern Pacific by issuing a bulletin as though the rules emanated from the railroad company, and the railroad company is ignored throughout. Rule 3 is omitted and rule 1, prohibiting the charging of an excess on cash fares is changed, so that the company exacts 10 cents additional for every cash fare under \$1, and 25 cents excess on fares of over \$1. Proceedings on this violation of the rules will also be instituted. The O. R. & N. is the only road complying strictly with the rules.

BURGLARS GET ONLY BULLETS

Two House Breakers Frustrated in Effort to Rob Dwelling.

Two attempted burglaries were reported to the police last night. In both cases the would-be thieves made their escape, but failed to accumulate any profit through the misdirected efforts. Shortly before midnight a burglar broke open the back door of the grocery store of August Story, 469 Williams avenue. The noise awakened Story, who barked in the building and in order to frighten the thief he fired three shots from the window of his bedroom. This action had the desired effect, for the burglar took to his heels and was soon lost to view in the surrounding darkness. Story was unable to furnish the police with a description of the housebreaker. A burglar tried to get into the residence of Emil Johnson, 443 Sixth street, last night, but was frightened away before he succeeded. In reporting the matter to the police Johnson asked that he be given some protection in future as he feared the burglar would return. Chief of Police Gritzmacher directed the officers on that beat to give the neighborhood of the Johnson residence their special attention during the hours of darkness.

LABOR UNIONS TO INDORSE CANDIDATES

Organizations Will Take Active Part in Coming Elections.

Organized labor of Portland and Multnomah county will take an active part and interest in the coming election and it is probable that the labor organizations will indorse candidates for office later in the campaign. The matter has been discussed at an informal meeting of a number of the labor leaders and plans are now being laid in that connection. It is a certainty that the movement will include the indorsement of Statement No. 1, should it be decided to become active as an organization in the campaign. In this case also it is expected that a concentrated effort will be made to elect one member of the legislature at least, and H. C. Parsons is being mentioned as a man suitable to make the race for the legislature. It is believed that the labor vote will also be thrown to W. M. Calk for senator, he having come out on a Statement No. 1 platform. Definite plans will be determined upon in a short time, a call having been issued for a general conference of the labor leaders on the advisability of entering the campaign and also to decide just how it is desired to get into the race, whether with a full ticket of labor men or by the indorsement of candidates already out for office.

SEATTLE EXPOSITION BILL MAY BE CUT
(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, Feb. 11.—The house committee on expositions gave a final hearing today on the Seattle Exposition bill. Representatives Cushman and Jones, Land Commissioner Ballinger, Major Richardson and D. A. Mackenzie of Alaska were heard. Congressman Jones asked that the appropriation for the Philippine and Hawaiian exhibits be increased to \$50,000 each, thereby increasing the bill to a total appropriation of \$750,000. A poll of the committee shows the majority favorable, but it is expected when the report is made that the amount will be reduced to about \$500,000.
