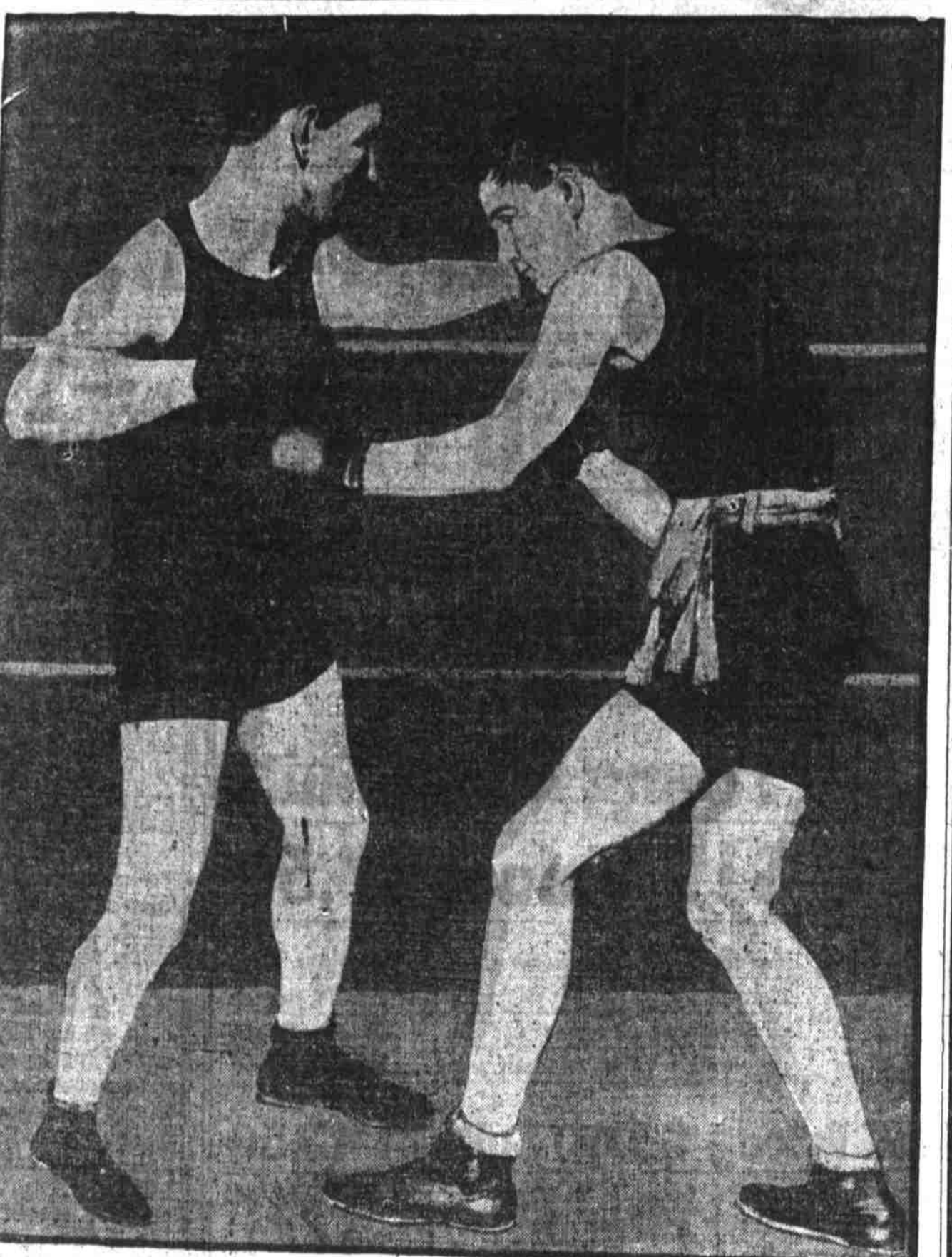
SIX TEAMS SURE TO BE IN LEAGUE

Some weeks ago The Journal exclusively announced that Bob Forbes would coach the state university football team and the news was received with surprise among football men all over the northwest.
