It is likely that the famous Goldfield gold camp in Nevada is soon to add another to its large number of producing mines. The Butte Boys Consolidated Mining company, in its development work, has passed through a test of five millings that shows mill tests averaging more than \$25 to the ton, and only requires water to begin operation of its quartz mill. The mill will transform the rock into gold bullion, or rather extract the gold from the rock. Being free milling, there is no expense for smelting or cyaniding the ore, so that on \$25 rock there will be a clear profit of upwards of \$20 to the ton. With the tremendous ledge it has in sight, its dump bears tangible evidence that stockholders in the property will soon be reaping a golden harvest upon their investments. The company's advertisement in another part of this paper tells considerable about the proposition.

Burglars forced an entrance to the Jacobson, Ede Co.'s plumbing establishment at 38 Davis street, last night by breaking a window in the rear of the building. CATHOLIC CHURCH BUYS BUILDING SITE

North Pacific Sanatorium Purchased From White Estate for \$72,600.

The North Pacific sanatorium block, bounded by Gisan, Hoyt and Twentieth streets, has been purchased by the Catholic church. The purchase price was \$60,000, paid to the Levi White estate, plus \$12,600 paid Dr. R. C. Coffey for his option on the block. Father George F. Thompson, secretary to Archbishop Christie, closed the transaction last Saturday. While no announcement has been made as to the future use of the property, it is believed that it will become the site of a splendid cathedral.

Dr. R. C. Coffey, who held a lease and option on the property, has conducted a sanatorium there for the past 12 years and under the terms of the recent sale will continue in possession of the property for three years longer.

This block is one of the most valuable sites in the city. It has a frontage of 200 feet on Twentieth street, and 310 feet on both Gisan and Hoyt, and contains 12 full-size city lots.
