He allowed the couple to get a couple of miles start before he took after them, but overtaking them near Alifala he emptied the rifle in the direction of the fleeing lovers. When the gun was empty the old man retraced his steps toward home. "You see," said the old Indian, "I don't want catch them, just want scare them like hell. I already got two sons-in-law. I don't board at my house, me think shoot lots scare him lots he no come back injun no fool."

Beaten into insensibility by a negro ruffian, George Schurtz, a violinist, was found lying in the street at 11 o'clock yesterday morning. Henry Sadder, a negro, was discovered covered with blood in a room near the scene of the assault and was arrested.

"Take your baby and get out of here," was the command given Mrs. J. Smith at 3 o'clock in the afternoon by two men who called her to the door of her home. She ran to a neighbor's house and gave the alarm but the thugs escaped before the arrival of the police.

After a desperate and bloody fight with a masked thug at a late hour last night J. A. Taylor, a real estate dealer, overpowered his assailant, pinned him to the ground and held him until the police arrived. When taken to the police station the holdup still wore his mask.

ceived from Washington indicates that he will probably endeavor to induce one or more of them to assent to the appointment of Burnett. The chief difficulty that would stand in the way would probably be Senator Fulton, who would naturally resent strongly the selection of any man named by Heney. Fulton's position on the judiciary committee would enable him to block the appointment of Burnett in the same way that he blocked Schuebel's.

**Bourne and Burnett.**

Senator Bourne, on the other hand, would be much more likely to acquiesce in the selection of Burnett. Bourne has been persistently playing up to the president and though he joined in recommending Cleator, it was done with reluctance and only after Schuebel was hopelessly out of the race. Moreover, Bourne's relations with Fulton are reputed to be exceedingly strained, and the latter's objections to a candidate named by Heney would find little sympathy with the junior senator. The fact that U'Ren has warmly endorsed Burnett would undoubtedly carry much weight with Bourne.

With Cleator out of the race, Congressman Hawley would presumably be in favor of Burnett, his fellow townsman, and Congressman Ellis is supposed to be equally perched on the fence. Dispatches from The Journal's special correspondent at Washington, published yesterday, indicated that Senator Fulton has been in entire ignorance of the effort to give the office to Burnett.

In the meantime, while all this wire-pulling is in progress at Washington, W. C. Bristol, counsel to the district attorney, is expected to discharge his duties of his office as district attorney. An indication that he may contribute to the pyrotechnics himself was afforded this morning when he appeared before Judge Wolverton and stated that unless some action was taken at once by the department of justice he would appoint an assistant, and clear out the clerk now in the office and proceed to clear up the docket. Mr. Bristol stated that Judge Becker called upon him yesterday and informed him that Attorney General Bonaparte had been advised by Becker and Heney to appoint B. D. Townsend as assistant district attorney. Bristol said to Judge Wolverton that he considered it his duty to call the attention of the court to the matter, also the fact that there are a number of federal prisoners in jail awaiting trial, and that some steps should be taken at once to disperse of their cases.

The first dispatch published in the next column plainly indicates that Heney's influence is still potent with the president in the matter of federal appointments in Oregon.

## RAILROAD OPERATORS TO GET SHORT HOURS

It was a tragic occasion and there was not a dry eye in the vast audience as the incident was told, how the mother, babe and 5-year-old Florence had bade the father good-bye, thinking to meet at their new home in Gaston, only to be hurled to death by a stone thrown from the place of parting. Many others were added to the crowd in the procession to the Forest View cemetery, where the mother and child were laid to rest in the same casket.

The Bates family had a large list of friends all over the state and Mrs. Bates came from a prominent family, the Dicksons.

Large crowds from Hillsboro, Cornelius, Gaston, Dilley and other points, together with throngs of people from this city, visited the scene of the wreck yesterday and today. The streetcar made trips to the depot all day yesterday and this morning carrying curiosity seekers.

An inquest was held over the bodies of Mrs. Bates and child and John McDonald yesterday afternoon at Victor E. Limber's undertaking parlors. It was the opinion of the jury that the accident was due to the sinking of the ties in soft ground and the consequent displacement of the rail; that in passing over the spot the engine loosened the spikes, the baggage coach and tender made the displacement and the smoking car broke the rail. However, this was not expressed in the verdict, which did not visit the scene of wreckage because the conditions had been entirely changed since the catastrophe, new rails put in place and the ties replaced. The opinion of all who have seen the broken rail that it was an old break, the two parts appearing rusty as though they had been exposed to the elements.
