THEODORA GETS SHOWER BATH

Rain God Displeased by Ceremony Which Removes American Money.

New York, Feb. 15.—Following the brilliant wedding ceremony which made Miss Theodora Shonts the Duchess de Chaulnes, the young couple left in a private car for Florida, where they will spend several weeks' honeymoon.
The wedding was most elaborate in every detail, but some of the society people who attended had an unpleasant experience, being caught by a blinding rainstorm which continued all day. The ceremony was performed in Mr. Shonts' mansion in East Thirty-fifth street by Archbishop Lavelle of Saint Patrick's cathedral, assisted by Rev. Father Byrns.
The ceremony was brief, the wedding party forming on the third story and trailing down embowered stairways to a lane formed of satin pillars, supported by a canopy of lilacs of the valley. The altar was arranged in the large drawing-room and before it the couple exchanged vows.
The bride wore an elaborate Worth creation, while the duke wore his orders and ribbons and made quite a resplendent appearance, completely towering his sober-clad father-in-law.
Only a few choice guests were permitted to see the wedding. The presents sent from all quarters of the globe, among which was a gift from President Roosevelt, actually beat the bride.
Mr. Shonts positively refused all information regarding the presents.
The father and mother of the bride, accompanied by the duke and duchess, Prince Gallitzin, Baron de Cande and Baron de la Boulliere, left tonight for Niagara Falls in a special train.
There was room at the house entrance for only one carriage at a time and because of a blockade feminine guests braved the storm and dragged their fine silks, satins and chiffons through the blinding rain.
This exhibition of discomfited society was a source of sardonic amusement to curiosity-seekers, who howled with delight when handsomely gowned guests with skirts tucked under their arms braved the storm for a most embarrassing walk.
Many a carefully polished high hat was blown into the middle of the muddy street and an umbrella carried by a footman over aggressive mistresses turned wrong side up. The guests' faces failed to see the ceremony, among them Mrs. James B. Haggan and Mrs. Stuyvesant Fish.

SMALL CASH PAYMENT.

Duke Only Gets \$300,000 as First Payment for Becoming Groom.

New York, Feb. 15.—Immediately following the wedding of Miss Theodora Shonts to the Duc de Chaulnes today there was a three-hour business conference held in a second-story room in the Shonts' mansion.
The duke and new duchess, Mr. and Mrs. Shonts, Paul D. Cravath, leading counsel for the Interoceanic railroad, and another lawyer made up the party, and by the time they had completed their conference all of the guests had departed. Lunch was served at the little meeting, but none of its discussion was permitted to leak out.
Mr. Shonts has lately by the United States idea, that there should be no settlement made for the bridegroom before the marriage; but it was everywhere rumored that immediately following the ceremony he had made a definite marriage settlement of \$300,000 upon his daughter's husband.
The duke and duchess remained in the Shonts mansion until 7:30 this evening, when they left in a automobile to take a special train awaiting them in the Grand Central station.

J. HAM LEWIS WANTS BIG ATTORNEY'S FEE

Chicago, Feb. 15.—Colonel James Hamilton Lewis, chief counsel for Dora McDonald, who was acquitted of the charge of murdering Webster Guerin, will file a claim in the probate court for \$25,000 against the estate of Michael McDonald, gambling king, for fees in conducting the woman's defense. Following it may be the claim for two leading associate counsel. It is understood they are to receive \$2,000 each.
Colonel Lewis, it is said, will contend that \$25,000 was provided for in a contract and arrangements with Michael McDonald preceding his death last August. Ten thousand dollars additional is the fee allowed by Mrs. McDonald.
This is said to be an attempt to place the burden of the expense upon Mrs. McDonald, and the claim may be fought.

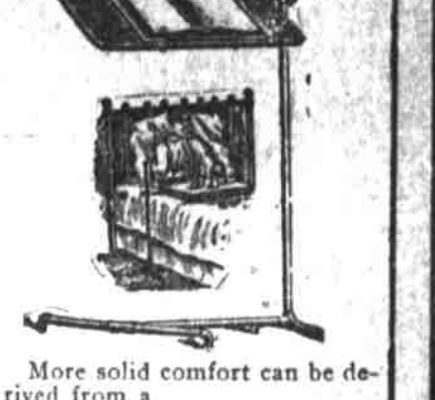

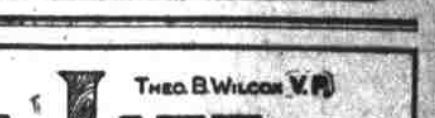

BIG STEAMSHIPS ON "HOOK" MUD BANKS

New York, Feb. 15.—In avoiding a collision in a heavy fog, which hung over the lower bay, the Cunard liner Lusitania, outward bound, with several hundred passengers and the Standard oil company's tank steamship Deutschland, also outgoing, both ran aground today in Medney channel, about two miles north of Hook. The Deutschland was floated with little difficulty under her own power without apparent damage and continued on her way, passing out to sea.
The Deutschland remained fast several hours but was finally floated.

FAVOR GOVERNMENT CORPORATION CONTROL

Washington, Feb. 15.—A poll of both the senate and house shows a strong current in favor of the bill introduced in the house last year by Representative William Randolph Hearst, providing for the national incorporation of corporations engaged in interstate commerce. Many senators today put themselves on record as being in favor of this bill, which aims to prevent the stock jobbers, which through corporations controlled and managed by reckless organizers have for years been such a menace to the public.

ACCUSES MOTHER OF KIDNAPING CHILD

Los Angeles, Feb. 15.—After pursuing his 16-year-old daughter Mildred from the Atlantic to the Pacific and vainly searching through three states for traces of her, the search covering a period of six years, Jacob Schib of Minneapolis today found the child in a suburb of Los Angeles and in the custody of his former wife, the mother of the girl, who he accuses of kidnaping the child.

JOHN BARRETT URGES SUBSIDY FOR SHIPS

Lincoln, Neb., Feb. 15.—John Barrett, formerly of Portland, Oregon, director of the International Bureau of American Republics, tonight delivered an address at the first annual dinner of the Lincoln Commercial club. He declared that South America was a rich field awaiting invasion from this country and urged a subsidy for American ships to carry the mails to the southern republics.
