

# ROAD JUGGLING MAKES MILLIONS FOR HARRIMAN

## Personal Profits of Magnate as Result of Union Pacific Manipulations More Than \$29,000,000—Stockholders Lose Money by Deals.

In report No. 943 issued by the interstate commerce commission appears a summary of the stocks in other railroads bought by the Union Pacific by Mr. Harriman's direction, says the New York World. Omitting minor matters, like the Pacific Fruit Express, the Fresno City railway and installment subscriptions, the stocks bought with the money and credit of the Union Pacific stockholders are their prices were:

These facts were brought out by the interstate commerce commission from the testimony of the Union Pacific officials. But both Edward H. Harriman and Kuhn, Loeb & Co. who were his bankers and brokers in these transactions, refused to tell who the seller to the Union Pacific was, the price at which the sellers bought and the profit that the sellers made.

A comparison of the past week's market values of these stocks with the price paid for them shows a loss by depreciation to the Union Pacific stockholders as follows:

But nowhere in the testimony does the individual profit of Edward H. Harriman and his partners appear. Questions on this point by the counsel of the interstate commerce commission were not answered either by Harriman or by the members of Kuhn, Loeb & Co. After a delay of many months a motion to compel the commission to answer before Judge Hough of the United States court for this district.

"One Who Had Stolen." Judge Hough decided that these questions must be answered, saying significantly in reply to the plea of Kuhn, Loeb & Co. that their transactions with Harriman were privileged:

"It would be a singular extension of the rule concerning privileged communications that permitted the identity of one depositing securities with a bank to be concealed by that merchant. The principle, if acknowledged, would screen one who had stolen what he so deposited."

Both Edward H. Harriman and Kuhn, Loeb & Co. have taken an appeal from the order of Judge Hough compelling them to answer the questions.

The Chicago & Alton railroad was sold to the Union Pacific stockholders at \$86.50 a share, 103,431 shares of the new Chicago & Alton railway stock, which, disregarding the bonds, had cost not more than \$5 a share. The Union Pacific paid \$8,946,781 for what, at the most liberal estimate, had cost Harriman, Stillman and Kuhn, Loeb & Co. more than half a million dollars.

Disregarding the \$3,000,000 received from the hypothecation of the railroad securities 80,000 shares of Illinois Central stock and the profits from selling Chicago & Alton bonds to themselves at 60 and 65 and reselling them to life insurance companies and others at 78 profits which Harriman and his associates made out of the Union Pacific stockholders by buying stocks at a low price and selling them to the company of which they are trustees at a high price were as follows:

As it happens, the loss to the Union Pacific stockholders is some \$12,000,000 more than the personal profits of Harriman and his associates, which is the result of general stock values being lower now than they were when Harriman bought or manufactured the stocks which he sold at high prices afterward to the Union Pacific.

# SNOW BLOCKS TEXAS TRACKS

## Passengers on Rock Island Route Suffer From Cold on Stalled Trains.

Washington, Feb. 18.—Rear Admiral Evans, commander-in-chief of the United States Atlantic fleet, will increase the speed of the battleships to more than 11 knots after the fleet leaves Callao, in order to reach Magdalena bay March 1. The 10 days' shore leave at Callao will not be reduced if there is any possible way of avoiding it.

Officials of the navy department say that the fleet can easily make from 11 to 12 knots without difficulty and have coal to spare. Arrangements are under way to send special naval inspectors to witness the target practice in Magdalena bay. The time which the fleet will remain there has not been definitely settled. The fleet will arrive in Callao, February 20.

## PITY THE SORROWS OF FARMER KELLOGG

Out \$34.65 Already for a Few Schooners, May Lose \$25 More.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Olympia, Wash., Feb. 18.—Several farmers of the Yakima valley got tired of trying to quench their thirst with Sunnyside canal water last summer and chipped in on a barrel of beer. The beer came from a distance, Sunnyside being a dry town in more ways than one, consigned to D. B. Kellogg, one of the farmers.

The incident has already cost Mr. Kellogg \$34.65 in addition to his proportion of the cost of the barrel and freight, and he has written a pathetic letter to the state treasurer explaining the whole circumstances to avoid putting up another \$25.

It seems a United States revenue collector who called three months after the last drop was gone doubted that the beer was owned and consumed by a close corporation. Mr. Kellogg says that in order to avoid trouble he paid for an internal revenue license. Since then the state treasurer has obtained from the revenue department a list of all persons holding United States licenses, and he recently sent Mr. Kellogg a notice to pay \$25 for a state license in accordance with a law passed by the last legislature.
