Recently there has been a great deal of discussion in regard to Dan Kelly, the world's champion sprinter, who holds the record of 2-5 seconds for 100 yards. OREGON UNABLE TO RETAIN COACH

Basketball Managers Forced to Let Murphy Go—Play One More Game.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) University of Oregon, Eugene, Feb. 21.—Except for the game with a team from Muscatine, Iowa, February 28, the basketball season for the University of Oregon is over. On account of lack of money Manager Nelson was compelled to dispense with the services of Coach Murphy and for the next two weeks the team will practice under the leadership of Captain Hathaway. While this will handicap the team to some extent Murphy has the team in good shape and they will be in good condition for the game.

The loss of the Multnomah club game which was to be played here Saturday night is a keen disappointment to the students, as it was expected that Oregon would retrieve its defeat by Multnomah last Saturday night. Through a mistake the Eugene High school obtained the armory for next Saturday evening so the game was called off. Multnomah wished to postpone it anyway, as they are to play the Portland team on Monday evening, but another date could not be arranged so the game was given up.

Coach Murphy was greatly hampered by lack of proper training quarters and other inconveniences and consequently the team has been handicapped to a great extent and could not show its full strength.

Practically all the games lost on the northern trip were lost by small margins. The work of Coach Murphy has been very satisfactory and the team, as a whole, has improved wonderfully under his guidance. With Murphy as coach next year Oregon should have one of the swiftest teams in the northwest. There will be three of the best men to graduate this year, Captain Hathaway, Van Scoy and Ramp but about half the team has left from which to select the 1908 team.

Bettors Figure That Ketchel Will Be Two to One Favorite.

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, Feb. 21.—In a vain endeavor to tempt the Sullivan money from its hiding, betting figures took another tumble and Ketchel is quoted as a 10 to 6 favorite. Even at that price there was no wild rush to get aboard the twin, and it was freely admitted that the price will go to 10 to 6. Whether it will eventually drop to 5 to 1, or has been predicted in certain circles, remains to be seen.

"If there is no Sullivan money in sight by tonight," said a well-known betting commissioner, "I guess we'll have to admit that the price will be 2 to 1. It's hard to say where the Sullivan backing is, so far there hasn't been much money, but it may come with a rush."

TUTION RAISE AT OLD WILLAMETTE

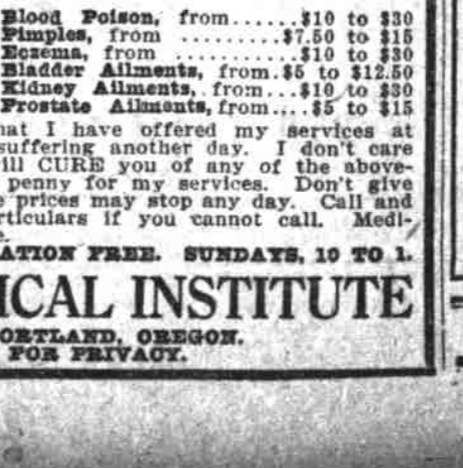
