TAGS FOR ALL **BUBBLE OWNERS**

Chauffeurs Will Have to Tell How They Do It and Why.

All automobile owners will have to appear at the city hall and register before the automobile board of registry before March 10. The annual fee is \$1 for owners and \$3 for chauffeurs. Badges have been ordered and will be furnished those who register as soon as they pass the examination required by the board. Here are some of the necessary qualifications required before a permit to run an automobile in Portland is issued.

The operator must have the free use

The operator must have the free use of both arms, must be more than 18 years of age, must have good eyesight and if a wearer of glasses they must be securely fastened to the head by spectacle frames; good hearing, free from epilepsy or heart disease, must not be an excessive user of alcohol or drugs, and last but not least must not be of reckless nature or subject to fainting fits.

All applicants must be able to show to the commissioners that they possess skill in navigating a buzz wagon, and he able to explain its mechanism from the sparker to the gasoline feed. No one shall be allowed to drive a car faster than 10 miles an hour within the city more more than six miles in rounding a nor more than six miles in rounding a

nor more than six miles in rounding a corner.

When a chauffeur applies for a license he is limited to a particular type of car, or else to all kinds. If he applies for a permit to drive a gasoline wayon he is furnished with a badge with a blue background and white numbers on which are the words, "licensed chauffeur." If he is a driver of an electric machine he is given a badge with a red background and white numbers; one who drives a steamer or gasoline machine receives a badge with a chocolate background and white numbers; to drivers of steamers a white badge with black numbers is given. To a man who wants a permit to drive any kind of a car a nickle plated badge with black numbers is given bearing the words "general licensed chauffeur."

Any person found violating the rules and regulations of the ordinance will be liable to a fine of \$50, or a jail sentence of \$0 days. In return the autolsts are protected by the law which provides a fine of \$100 or a jail sentence of 60 days for any person found tampering with or injuring the machine of a licensed owner or chauffeur.
